



- Make notes on the pieces, pull apart the pieces and file them in any way useful.

- Pray for the folks who contributed the pieces and for all church communicators everywhere that we communicate well the wonderful words of life!

About the Great Idea Swap

The Great Idea Swap is a ministry within the ministry of Effective Church Communications.

The purpose of the Great Idea Swap

The purpose of the Great Idea Swap goes far beyond sharing design ideas. *The purpose of the Great Idea Swap is for church communicators to help, inspire, and encourage other church communicators by sharing their samples and ideas. Effective Church Communications serves as the host and facilitator of this process.*

This sharing is important because though the ultimate purpose of effective church communication is to fully fulfill the Great Commission, we each express our calling in church communication to our specific church in a variety of design styles, use of color, artwork, wording, type, layout. As director of this ministry, I know what has worked for me and what might be of use to you, but I have no idea of all the resources you might need, what idea might inspire you, what content might challenge you. I do know someone out there has those ideas and we can learn from each other in ways that are wonderful.

I also know that merely trying to copy the communication techniques of big churches or the latest mega church of the month is not the answer and a rather nasty habit I want you to avoid. God does not intend every church to be a mega church and the results of mimicking them is seldom as impressive as we might hope and sometimes downright inappropriate and goofy. However, as you look over what other church communicators are doing in churches of a variety of sizes and denominations, you may find just the modification or idea you need to make your communication project more effective for your people. Chances are a church-changing idea will be some small thing, a minor modification that was just what you needed.

The Great Idea Swap is a tool to facilitate mutual sharing, encouragement, idea swapping, and inspiration among church communicators. It is structured and edited by me, Yvon Prehn. I try to provide kind and minimal moderation as I organize the material into collections of similar communications for you to view and access what you need.

Some of the files are selected and put on the website along with comments, but the majority of the Great Idea Swap files are collected into books without any comments for several reasons. First, so you can pull from them what is useful to you without any influencing opinion. Second, the volume of materials makes this necessary. For example, the Great Idea Swap book on church bulletins, has 24 bulletins and a total of 101 pages. There are three downloads of church newsletter samples, each of over 100 pages of examples and the other collections are similar. Most of them range from 50 to over 100 pages. The simplest way for me to pass this mass of materials on to you was to put them together in an easy to scan PDF that you can either search through on your computer or print out.

The process of putting together materials for the Great Idea Swap:

1. Church communicators share their communications with Yvon Prehn. These can be emailed at any time to yvon@effectivechurchcom.com.

- 2. The communications can be in a variety of formats from MS Word to Adobe's Creative Suite; many come in MS Publisher. They can also be sent in PDF format.
- 3. We then take them and, if necessary, convert them to Adobe PDF.
- 4. Some of the files are put on the website, www.effectivechurchcom.com for online viewing and with comments from Yvon Prehn. The ones on the website are just a small portion of the materials available.
- 5. For the majority of the materials, the separate files are combined them into downloadable PDF.
- 6. The books are then made available to church communicators for very reasonable costs (we've got to pay for hosting, software, time to covert, assemble, etc., but we keep it as inexpensive as we can) through the storefront on our website at www.effectivechurchcom.com.
- 7. The books offered as downloads are very inexpensive--from \$5-\$10 each for between 50-100 pages of examples, even less for very short collections.
- 8. The downloads are offered on a new Storefront on our website that is different from the www.lulu.com/yvonprehn storefront. The LULU site will still have book downloads (they will be available for the same price both places) but paperback books and CDs will only be available on the LULU site, because they produce and ship them. As we finish a group of the Great Idea Swap communications in PDF format, we will make them available on a CD if people prefer that.

How to become part of the Great Idea Swap

Periodically we offer incentives (usually a free e-book) for contributing to the Great Idea Swap. If you have materials you'd like to share, you can put them into a file until then, or send them to us any time (even if there is no free book) with a note giving us permission to use them. You can send almost any file format to yvon@effectivechurchcom.com.

As soon as enough are sent in a specific area, we'll collect and put out new Great Idea Swap materials. If we send out a request for a certain type of material, we'll be able to get out collections sooner.

Your contributions are greatly appreciated and you never know how your work might inspire a fellow church communicator and a life might be changed for time and eternity.

We have an extraordinary calling—the Great Idea Swap is a way we can encourage each other in it.

Look at this list of names and tell me what they all have in common: George Washington, Al Jolson, Margaret Thatcher, Roger Bannister & Neil Armstrong

Do you see the connection? They all have this thing in common: each person was the "first" in some category ... the first person to do something special or unique. Those five people are the first on the moon, the first to run a sub-4-minute mile, the first person's voice ever heard over a "talking picture," the first female prime minister of the United Kingdom, and the first president of the United States. By the way, if you don't already know which is which, you can have some fun family conversation time over the dinner table, trying to find out who can match up those "firsts" correctly. Now I want to add to your list another special first; Jesus' first appearance after the resurrection.

What difference would it make to be the first to see Jesus after the resurrection? Why would it matter? Hundreds of people saw Jesus after His resurrection. Wouldn't each person be equally blessed to see Jesus alive again? Wouldn't every follower be ecstatic with new-found hope and joy to see that Jesus had risen?

Perhaps, but let me ask it this way: how would you feel if YOU were the one who was chosen by Jesus to be the VERY FIRST ONE that he revealed himself to, in His newly risen body? Not James, not John, not Peter ... but you! Not to the soldiers ... not to Pilate ... not even to the high priest ... but to YOU. Of all the people Jesus could have chosen to reveal himself to FIRST, so that for all of history, your name would be at the top of the list of the most significant events that ever occurred. How would that kind of an awesome blessing strike you? In order for you to know what that would be like, you would have to imagine yourself standing in the sandals of Mary Magdalene, because the first appearance of Jesus after his resurrection was to her.

Who was this privileged woman, chosen by Jesus to be blessed by his first appearing? We know from her title, Mary Magdalene, that she was in some way associated with the city of Magdala. Magdala was a rather populous town on the coast of Galilee about three miles from Capernaum. It was a city of commerce (a port city) and a city known for its textiles and dye works. She could have been called "Magdalene" because she was born or lived most of her life there, or it could have been because she made her wealth there. Luke 8:1-3 tells us that Mary and some other women were helping to support Jesus and the disciples out of their own means. If she were a wealthy woman who had "made her millions," so to speak, in Magdala, then that could explain why

Why Do We Dye?

OK, by a show of hands: how many of you catch a whiff of cider vinegar and instantly think of Easter egg dye? I remember vividly my mother boiling a

large pot of eggs every Good Friday for us to color. It's a tradition I still enjoy.

Like so many holiday traditions, the origin of Easter eggs is somewhat unclear. A search of several internet sites revealed a smattering of fact and opinion; but one common consensus is that the first use of eggs in holy day traditions trace back to Pagan times. Before the egg became closely entwined with the Christian Easter, it was honored during many rite-of-Spring festivals. The egg represented the rebirth of the earth. The long, hard winter was over; the earth burst forth and was reborn just as the egg miraculously burst forth with life. The egg, therefore, was believed to have special powers. It was buried under the foundations of buildings to ward off evil and given to newlyweds to step on when entering their home as a new couple. The Romans, Gauls, Chinese, Egyptians and Persians all cherished the egg as a symbol of the universe. From ancient times eggs were dyed, exchanged, and shown reverence.

As was common practice centuries ago, the leaders of the Catholic church started replacing pagan traditions with their own, often adding new meanings to old symbols and festivals in order to further the spread of Christianity. Pope Gregory the Great (540-604 AD) ordered his missionaries to do just that, and the Christian celebration of the Resurrection of Christ seemed ideally suited to replace the pagan feast of "Eostre." Many of the traditions were adopted into church festivities, beginning the Christian observation of the Easter Holy Day. Pope Gregory was admired by John Calvin, who declared that Gregory was "the last good pope."

The practice spread throughout the world and was flavored by local beliefs. Polish legends surrounding eggs blended folklore and fact. One such tale speaks of when Mary Magdalene went to the sepulcher to anoint the body of Jesus. She had with her a basket of eggs to serve as a repast. When she arrived at the sepulcher and uncovered the eggs, the pure white shells had miraculously taken on a rainbow of colors. Traditionally, Russian Orthodox Easter eggs were dyed red to represent the blood of Christ shed on the cross. The hard shell of the egg symbolized the sealed Tomb of Christ the cracking of which symbolized his resurrection from the dead. Although the omens and the mystery of the egg have disappeared today, the symbolism remains, and artists continue in the old

world tradition of adorning eggs.

The most famous decorated Easter eggs were those made by the well-known goldsmith, Peter Carl Faberge. In 1883 the Russian Czar, Alexander, commissioned Faberge to make a special Easter gift for his wife, the Empress Marie. This special Faberge egg so delighted the Czarina that the Czar promptly ordered the Faberge firm to design further eggs to be delivered every Easter. In later years Nicholas II, Alexander's son, continued the custom. Fifty-seven eggs were made in all, and are today nearly priceless artifacts. In 2002, one sold for a record 9.2 million dollars.

Today, the dying and hunting of Easter eggs is a popular celebration throughout the world. Even the President of the United States gets in on the act every Easter with a White House Egg Hunt. But the big question IS...what do you do with all those boiled eggs afterward? The uses of boiled eggs seem fairly limited to deviled eggs and egg/tuna/ chicken salad. I am a fan of the traditional deviled egg; but every now and then, I like to spice things up. Here are a few variations on the old stand-by; why not try one out this year? These recipes and more like them can be found on the website www.allrecipes.com.

Each of these recipes is for one dozen boiled eggs. Simply cool and peel the eggs and then slice in half. Spoon out yolks and mash with fork, together with other ingredients listed. Pipe or spoon egg filling back into boiled whites.

Deviled Ham Eggs

Deviled Ham and eggs; perfect together! Buy deviled ham in the canned meat section of your grocery store. Do not attempt to substitute "potted meat product;" it looks the same, but it's NOT.

- 1 (4.5 ounce) can deviled ham
- 1 tablespoon spicy brown mustard
- 1/4 cup mayonnaise
- 1 pinch black pepper
- 24 slices black olives
- Paprika for sprinkling

Creamy Ranch Eggs

Cream cheese gives an extra richness to these zippy eggs

- 1/3 cup Ranch-style salad dressing
- 1/2 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 dill pickle, finely chopped




Bacon and Cheese Eggs

How God Sees Them

I work with children who are severely disabled. They will never walk, they will never talk more than a few words (if that), and they will never be potty trained. Their bodies, as crippled as they appear, will continue to mature and grow... but their brains cannot keep up. They lack the ability to say "I love you" and "thank you" to their daddy and mommy. They lack the ability to say "I need a drink," or "my tummy hurts."

Every day I walk into a building filled with children who have special needs. In my classroom there are seven: James, Rachelle, Rose, Charles, Ann, Marie, and Elise. Each one is different in their needs, abilities, moods and personalities... but they all have this in common: they were all lovingly created by God. I have the privilege of changing their diapers, feeding them through tubes, and playing with them! Some-

times my heart aches for them and the many things they will never be able to do; but I know that God made them with a meaning and a purpose. Maybe it's to teach *others* something?

Last night I had a dream about some of the kids I work with. Rachelle was running around a back yard playing and smiling and bouncing a ball. No wheelchair, no special shoes to make her feet grow correctly- just her acting like a healthy, growing child. Then there was 7-year-old James, riding down the street on his bike, instead of a wheelchair. He called my name and laughed as he came towards me for a hug.

I believe that God gave me this dream so that I will see the children in wheel-chairs the way He sees them. When people see me out in public with one of my students, I get a lot of funny looks. They silently say, "I'm glad I don't have

your job" or "God bless you- I could never have the patience for a kid like that." That's only because they see the outside; they see the chair and the breathing tubes and the lack of response from the child's face. If they could see inside—what God sees—they might feel differently. They might feel blessed to work with a child like this, or even to parent a child like this.

Today I saw my students a little more like God sees them. I could imagine them running, playing, and laughing like healthy non-handicapped children. Without that dream from God, I may have never been able to! I left my job crying today. One day in Heaven, all these dear ones will walk and run and laugh and express themselves in a way they never could on earth. They will be whole in God's presence- the way He has always seen them.

she was called Mary Magdalene. In addition, she is not mentioned in connection with a husband, or described as someone's mother, so it is also likely that she was described by the town of Magdala because she did not have a marriage relationship that would otherwise be her "title."

Because Mary Magdalene is first mentioned in Luke 8, right after the story of an unnamed woman of sinful reputation who anointed Jesus' feet, many have tried to say that the unnamed prostitute of Luke 7 is actually Mary Magdalene of Luke 8. The poor reputation of the city of Magdala (a seaman's hangout) and the fact that Mary had once been demon possessed is cited as substantiating evidence that Mary Magdalene was this ex-prostitute; but there really is not enough evidence to make this assumption. There are some legitimate assumptions we can make, though. We can assume that she was most likely well-off, that she was probably unmarried, and that she was definitely a woman whose transformation was extreme, from being a demoniac to a passionately devoted follower of Jesus Christ.

Do we have good reason to speak highly of Mary Magdalene? Can we really know for certain that she was a passionately devoted follower of Christ? Well, let's consider the evidence. Her financial contribution would seem to indicate this in part, since we rarely invest large sums of money with no hope of a financial return, unless we believe strongly in the cause. And her presence at the cross would also speak volumes about her dedication to Christ. How many of the disciples were at the cross as Jesus was being crucified? Was Peter there? Was James there? What about Nathaniel or Philip or Thomas? We have no record of those men being there. John was the only one of the apostles who was there. Along with him, there were a number of women, including Mary Magdalene. But why was she there, risking the damaging association and the possible harm? For this reason: her love for her Savior was no pragmatic fancy. She may not have understood why he died and she may have even struggled with doubts that many of Christ's followers were undoubtedly facing. But nevertheless, she was there. She had faith in this man, Jesus, even as he hung there dying on the cross. She was a passionately devoted follower of Christ.

The example of Mary is quite convicting, I must admit. Do I, like Mary Magdalene, love Jesus without reservation? Do I trust

my soul into his hands, no matter what the future may hold? I must be able to answer this question with a resounding, "Yes!" My eternal future rests on my answer to that question. The direction of my entire life on this earth will unfold with my answer.

Mary Magdalene was there as they nailed him to the cross. She was there and saw him die. She saw the legs of the other men broken, and she saw as Jesus' side was pierced. She was there as Nicodemus and Joseph (from Aramathea) took Jesus' body from the place of crucifixion and carried it to a burial cave that had been recently cut, quickly preparing his body for the tomb. She saw that he was not adequately prepared and that the task would need to be completed later, after the Sabbath. She left the tomb as one of the very few who actually saw his form disappear behind the massive rock that covered his "final resting place." She was a complete witness to his death and his burial. And she made plans with the other ladies to return after the Sabbath, to bring the spices and to give one last honor to Jesus, by completing the preparation of his body for the tomb.

"I have seen the Lord! I know He is alive!"


On Sunday morning, Mary Magdalene was the first to go to the tomb. Other women went to the tomb that morning as well, but Mary Magdalene arrived while it was still dark according to John 20. The other women came soon after the sun had risen, but by that time Mary Magdalene had seen the empty tomb and had gone to tell Peter and John about it. She either did not see the angels or God hadn't sent them yet, because when she returned to proclaim what she saw, she made no mention of angels. Peter and John had a foot race to the tomb, and Mary followed along behind; so far behind that the two men had come and gone before her second arrival at the tomb. The others had received the message of the angels. Peter, John and even the other women had come to the tomb and heard the message of the angels that Jesus was alive. But Mary did not know of this message of hope yet. John 20 tells us that Mary Magdalene, still weeping and crying, stooped over to look into the tomb. At that point, she saw the angels. They were dressed in white and were sitting down, one at the head of the empty death-wrap, and one at the foot. She had seen the cloths lying there herself a couple days earlier, filled with the body of Jesus, but this time they were empty.

The angels who looked like young men said, "Woman, why are you crying?" She answered, "Because they have taken my Lord, and I don't know where they have put him."

Even as she said these words, Jesus was standing behind her. As she turned around, she did not recognize who he was in much the same way that the two men on the road to Emmaus did not recognize the resurrected Jesus. Her heart of love for her Lord Jesus who had died was breaking, and her sadness was now compounded by the thought that someone had hideously and cruelly taken his body from the tomb in which he had been laid to rest in peace. Jesus spoke to her: "Woman, why are you crying? Who are you seeking?" She thought that he was the groundskeeper and asked him, "Sir, if you have taken him away, tell me where he is and I will take care of his body." Jesus then replied simply, "Mary." Jesus once said, "I call my sheep by name and they know my voice." So it was with Mary Magdalene, because when he called her by name she knew it was Jesus, alive and standing before her. She grasped hold of him and cried out, "Rabboni!" meaning "my Master!" Jesus then told her not to attempt to hold on to him, because he was not going to remain on earth, but was going to return to the Father. So she let go and went on her way, again with a message to share. The first message she had earlier that morning was a confused message of despair, but this time the message was an exuberant message: "I have seen the Lord and He is alive!"

And this dear woman was the FIRST ever to utter those words, "I have seen the Lord. I know He is alive!" Before Jesus was done, he would have revealed himself to well over 500 people; but Jesus chose to reveal himself to Mary before everyone else. Why did the Lord reveal himself to Mary first? What could have been his motivation? We cannot speak authoritatively ... to say that we know for sure the reason for this FIRST AP-PEARING. But we do know that his first appearing was only the beginning. The resurrected Jesus has been disclosing himself to millions of people for thousands of years. His resurrection life has been the symbol of the eternal life, purchased on the cross, for everyone who believes.

This year, as we celebrate resurrection Sunday, consider this question: What difference does the resurrection make? Am I echoing Mary's words, "I have seen the Lord. I know He is alive!"?

What is wrong with me?

Do you ever ask yourself that question when you find yourself failing or lacking the strength in the times of difficulties? Proverbs 24:10 says, "If you are slack in the day of distress your strength is limited." The proverb is simply teaching that when we fail during the trials of life we lack strength. Do you find yourself lacking strength? So what's the spiritual solution? Proverb 10:5-6 says, "A wise man is strong, and a man of knowledge increases power. For by wise guidance you will wage war, and in abundance of counselors there is victory." Remember there are always spiritual battles going on around us. We are constantly in a state of war, Spiritual War. Though Christ has given us victory through the cross, we are still called to fight and be faithful through the hard

times. We are called to remain strong to "Fight the good fight" (I Timothy 6:12). We are called to remain strong because the strength that we are given comes from God. 1 John 4:4 says, "Ye are of God, little children, and have overcome them: because greater is he that is in you, than he that is in the world."

If our strength comes from God then why do we still fail under trials? Where does it all go wrong for most of us? Without sounding two simplistic, our lack of strength is attributed to: 1) our lack of God's knowledge and wisdom. James 1:5 teaches us that we are to ask for wisdom when going through difficult times. 2) our willingness to take advice from others that are not following God's Word. Chapter one of 1 John teaches us that if we walk in darkness or seek out the world's wavs we cannot have fellowship with God, the source of our strength. How many of

you would fast for one week before a big marathon you wanted to win? You would probably not have the physical strength to even begin the race because the source of your physical strength is food. Your source of all strength is God. Without proper fellowship you will be weak and will fail when trials come. Close fellowship with God is the key to your strength. The closer you are with God the more you will thirst for His knowledge and wisdom, and the stronger you will become.

Sin is the cancer that will rob us of spiritual strength and leave us wondering. "What is wrong with me?" If you're caught in the same trap you only need to seek the knowledge of God that says, "If we confess our sins He is faithful and righteous to forgive our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteous" (I John 1:9).

Pray for the Persecuted

Someone living in China or Africa may seem a world away, literally. But for believers, we have family literally all over the world. Many of these brothers and sisters are suffering intense persecution of a type we cannot even imagine here in America. This persecution has risen to new heights and those of us in safer parts of the world must pray, pray, pray for the safety of those affected. Still, Satan cannot thwart the effect the truths of scripture; as is often the case, Christianity continues to spread in these areas despite the opposition.

In February, violence erupted in Nigeria as Muslim gangs attacked Christians and destroyed churches over the results of a recent election. In China, more than 400 Christian college students in Beijing were arrested in November of last year and interrogated about their beliefs. Four leaders of house churches were sentenced to "re-education" through labor for one to one and a half years. A report from Mexico City in December of 2008 shows that as the number of evangelical Christians in southern Mexico has grown, hostilities from "traditionalist Catholics" have kept pace. Especially in indigenous communities in southern Mexico, the prevailing attitude is that only traditionalist Catholics, who blend native rituals with Roman Catholicism, have rights to religious practice, according to news reports. Moreover, the reports indicate the traditionalist Catholic villagers believe they have the right to force others to conform to their religion. Those that do not have been jailed, fined, and threatened with depravation of basic services such as water and electricity.

Pakistan, India, Iran, Vietnam, Iraq, Belarus, Africa: all across the globe Christians are forced to meet in secret to do what we take for granted every Sunday. You can read journal entries from a group of teens who actually smuggled Bibles into Vietnam in 2006. You can also check out ways you can help support Christians under persecution in other parts of the world.

If you had your photo taken recently for our new Pictorial Directory, you were asked to bring canned food in exchange for a \$5 off coupon on the photographs. What a great idea! The food collected produced a total of 305 pounds that has been donated to the Multi-Service Center.

In addition, as part of their "Feed the Need" program, LifeTouch, the photographers, will donate the value of four meals for each family photographed. The number of families photographed was 192, which would result in a dollar amount for 768 meals. The actual dollar amount is determined based on the reported value of four meals purchased by local food banks. We hope to give an account of the final dollar amount in the next Messenger.

The 305 pounds of food collected during the photo shoot brings the total Lenexa UMC donations for the year to 2,472.5 pounds through the end of May. We continue to ask for food donations. Your donation of even one can or box per week can make a difference for a family who may have a member that has had to skip a meal in order to feed their children.

¹²2009 Kansas East Annual Conference Recap

The 2009 session of the Kansas East Annual Conference was held June 3 – 6, 2009 at Baker University in Baldwin City, under the leadership of Bishop Scott Jones. The theme was "The Church United: Called to Lead" which began a four-year cycle lifting up the four areas of focus set by the General Conference in 2008. The conference celebrated facilities improvements made in camping, campus ministry, and ministry expansion in church growth and development through the Bridges to the Future Capital Campaign.

The Rev. Adam Hamilton, senior pastor at United Methodist Church of the Resurrection, was the featured speaker on the theme of leadership. Bishop Sally Dyck, Minnesota Area, preached at the ordination and commissioning service and shared a dialogue sermon with Jones for the sending forth service. The Rev. Junius Dotson, Saint Mark United Methodist Church in Wichita, preached at the memorial service.

The conference adopted a budget of \$5.05 million for 2010 and changed the conference's apportionment formula to a tithe on local church operating income. The new formula will be phased in over a number of years with a 10 percent annual cap on increases and decreases to a local church's apportionments. This new way of apportioning, will actually reduce the amount of apportionments paid by Lenexa United Methodist Church, but increase the total funds received by the annual conference. The conference also adopted a resolution moving the annual session from Baker

University to United Methodist Church of the Resurrection in 2010 which will result in a savings to the conference of approximately \$30,000.

The conference contributed \$5,750 to the Central Conference Pension Fund from the conference's Oil and Gas Reserves Fund from mineral rights the conference owns in Arkansas and Oklahoma.

The conference voted on the 32 proposed constitutional amendments approved by the 2008 General Conference, but the results were not publicized. To go into effect, the amendments must be passed by 2/3 of the total number of voting members of all annual conferences worldwide. The Council of Bishops will announce the results in 2010.

Jones commissioned three into the ministry of elder, recognized the orders for ministry for one person, ordained one deacon received into full connection, and ordained seven elders received into full connection. Eight retired from ministry, one of course being Jan Hayen.

Membership in the Kansas East Conference stands at 71,305, down 760 (I percent) from 2007. Worship attendance stands at 31,903, up 378 (I.2 percent) from 2007. Sunday School participation stands at 11,800, up 204 (I3 percent) from 2007.

Recyling Updates

Many of you have experienced the recycling bin on the Church's property being full. We apologize for this inconvenience, but the problem has been remedied. Deffenbaugh is now coming weekly to collect our recyclables (instead of every other week). So please to continue to bring paper, plastics, aluminum, and tin to place in the recycling container located on the southwest corner of our property. Not only are you helping the environment, but the church receives \$12.50 per ton for the recyclable materials. This can really add up! Thanks for your on-going donations!!

Yard Work is in full swing......please consider the 3 R's of yard waste as you plant, mow, weed, prune, water, etc: **Reduce**, **Reuse**, **and Recycle**. Ideas include mulching instead of bagging, using a rainwater barrel, keeping an eye on sprinklers on timers so they don't come on when it's raining/has just rained, composting, xeriscaping, and more.

Note from the Pastor

"What's it worth?" is a question we ask ourselves more often these days. The relative worth of something is calculated before every purchase. If an important (worthy) need might be met by a certain item, and if that item can be proved to be worth its cost, then maybe, just maybe, it will be purchased. There's no hurry. When every dollar is spent only after this careful consideration, it makes that dollar seem worth more than a dollar. Looked at this way, every dollar earned is worth more. Every dollar saved is worth more. We feel better off *not* spending. For individuals and families with a fiscally conservative heritage, "What's it worth?" is a question to keep in mind even in good times.

The meaning of worship is closely related to the idea of "worth." The words themselves are first cousins. Webster's Dictionary defines worship as "to regard with great, even extravagant respect, honor or devotion." We come to worship in order to demonstrate our regard for and devotion to God. We find God to be worth our highest, most extravagant respect. Someone exists who is the most good, the most powerful, the most knowledgeable, and the very definition of every positive quality we can imagine. This Someone is God.

The purpose of worship, therefore, is to praise God. Everything else in a worship service flows from praise. Listening. Repentance. Thankfulness. Prayer requests. Promises to act. Someone this good, this loving, this knowledgeable, is "worth paying for" with our respect, our attention, and our obedience. Worship is "worthship."

Two points flow from this definition of worship. First, the worship of God raises the worth of everything else. Each moment of each day will feel most important when I have given God the respect and honor God is worth each day. Each day of each week will find its truest and best value when I have offered God my worship on one of those days. Every act of love I share will reflect the love I have received from and given back to God. Every dollar I spend will grow in value when I have worshipped God with a worthy number of my or my family's dollars.

Second, *that* we worship is more important than *how* we worship. If a certain period of time on a certain day gives me and my friends a way to praise God, to listen to God, and to respond to God, then we have worshipped. For the past academic year, we have worshipped in three different ways every Sunday. Each hour has been worship. This summer, I will help lead worship for one hour. As worship planners, I and our design team will do our very best to make the 10:00 hour an appropriately special time to praise God, to listen to God, and to respond to God. *To worship*.

From the Music Director

A late season snow in March threw a monkey wrench in the routine of everyone's life here in our area. Schools were closed and folks were hampered in their ability to get around, such that many missed work or other appointments. It forced us out of our normal patterns, to consider what to do with time at home. Some of us played in the snow, others read a good book, others baked brownies or had popcorn and watched a movie. Those less fortunate had to huddle near their wood stove to keep warm, since their electricity was out, and all had to either shovel or scrape the stuff off their car or driveway. Despite the problems it brings, most of us recognize and appreciate snow's beautiful effect on the landscape.

In times like these we are reminded about our powerlessness over natural forces, and the caprice of fate. Something bigger than our plans and activities is going on. If we listen carefully, we can hear this bigger symphony behind our usual business, but we usually are too preoccupied to listen.

Music is like this snow. It's something we can't really ignore. It goes into the crevices of our lives, affecting how we feel, what we see; it is something we must deal with. Like the snow, it provides a similar opportunity to see a bigger picture, to feel that our personal concerns are not all that matter in life, to know beauty that we had not paid attention to before. In all cases, music becomes a part of our felt experience, both personally and collectively when it is heard in public. Just as we all talk about the weather because it affects us, so we talk about music and how it affects us.

The real joy is that in making music, we get to act as God's agents of creation. We can make snow! We can affect people's experience in a visceral way. This is a powerful ability, and one that carries no small responsibility. An amazing

capacity to affect people's mood, and sometimes even change their lives, is in the hands of those who make music. Since it does have a real affect, we should bear in mind our responsibility in it, so that we make the experience a positive one for those who listen. This requires an investment of care through disciplined practice and a positive attitude. Our work is most perfectly realized through honest expression of feelings suggested by the musical score. This requires vulnerability, and an understanding of the human condition, for which we must draw upon our personal experience. We intend that as we minister in this way, people will be blessed. We invite your prayers, and your participation, to that end!

To raise awareness of the hunger needs in our world, the Missions Team Subcommittee on Hunger offers these facts as food for thought.

• Children are twice as likely to live in households where someone experiences hunger and food insecurity than adults.

Research shows that pre-school and school-aged children who experience severe hunger have higher levels of chronic illness, anxiety and depression, and behavior problems than children with no hunger.

The Lenten Offering in April was dedicated to the Society of St. Andrew, St. James the Less Free Clinic and Pathways.

• In a survey conducted by The United States Conference of Mayors in 2006, almost half the cities surveyed (45 pecent) said they were not able to provide an adequate quantity of food to those in need. And 63 percent of surveyed cities reported they had to decrease the quantity of food provided and/or the number or times people could come to get food assistance. And this was before the economic crisis of 2008-2009!

Blinn reminded us that the "holy rollers" would be bicycling to the Annual Conference this year from Lynchburg to Norfolk. The group now includes Bob and Mary Beth Blinn, Dave Stoakley and Ron Lefever. This will be a fund raiser for the conference offerrig.

Finance Team coordinator Bill Flexon presented a report showing a deficit of about \$10,000. Expenses are controlled but revenues have not come in as projected. The team is monitoring the finances on a weekly basis. There was general discussion and some suggestions for helping the congregation understand the impact of the economic downturn on the church.

Council coordinator Danny Phillips reported that the Child and Youth Protection Policy is being reviewed.

Mission Team coordinator, Pat Koontz, reported there are 32 people on the team. We have fed 145 meals this year, and the Food Team will be working a day at the Central Virginia Food Bank. We have two full scholarships for the All God's Children's Camp. We are supporting a Heart Havens concert at R-MC on May 23. We will work with St. Ann's Catholic Church hosting CARITAS in July.

There was some discussion prompted by Tim Ernst regarding

32 amendments to the church constitution which will be brought to votes at Annual Conference. Tim will inform us of the issues with a slide presentation.

A committee has met with an architect regarding changes to improve the sanctuary.

Dawne Vronek reported that the Campus Ministry team has been meeting regularly and there will be a campus group meeting every Saturday. They also decided to focus on a service project.

April 16, 2008 – Summary

The Worship Team recommended one worship service to be held at 10:00 a.m. throughout the summer until Rally Day. After discussion, council approved with the understanding that if the attendance and revenues drop significantly over past years' history, another service could be reinstated.

Lay Leader Dave Stoakley's report led to Council members being asked to review the 32 amendments that will be voted upon at the Annual Conference and to give our input to those who will vote, including: Bob Blinn, Sandra Stanley, Tim Ernst and Dave Stoakley. The issues can be reviewed on the conference website – www.vaumc.org.

Stoakley will distribute information to council members about the Five Talent Academy. Council needs to determine if we want to participate and become a Five Talent Church. Several staff and

members attended a training recently and a decision must be made by Council before Annual Conference. If we sign the covenant, we will receive guidance and training from church leaders of Virginia congregations who have been successful in growing attendance, stewardship, and mission outreach. Cost is about \$200 per year for three years.

Dave Beish reported that a record attendance on Easter Sunday brought our revenues to just above the budgeted level, but we are still behind last year's revenue-to-date.

There is a silent auction planned for the Ashland Strawberry Faire. The UMW will host a yard sale and youth will have activities. The Mission Team will take responsibility for overseeing that the church is open to the public. Council agreed to have professional cleaning that evening with payment from the cleaning budget.

Dawne Vronek said that there is still an urgent need for adult chaperones for youth activities.

Allyse Harris reported that the Holy Week breakfasts were successful. The youth would be addressing details of their "Invisible Children" fundraiser and the August mission trip at their next meeting.

There is a tentative churchwide meeting scheduled for July 19. Church Council meetings are open to all and held at 7:00 p.m. on the third Thursdays monthly.

- 1. Boyfriend/girlfriend
- 2. Other friends
- 3. Life in general
- 4. Someone you want to go out with
- 5. Music

Fishing for Men

Help family members see how they're influenced and how they can influence others with this devotion adapted from Mike Gillespie's book *You Want Us To Do What?* (Concordia Publishing House)

Pass around a fishing pole with an artificial worm attached to

the end of the line. (Be creative if you don't have a real fishing pole.) Ask family members to talk about the best ways to catch fish.

Ask: How does a fish know the difference between live bait and a lure? Which kind do you think works best? Why?

Say: We're often persuaded in life to try something new or follow someone's example or cause. Let's be human fish and take a closer look at that. Have family members write on a large piece of paper persuasive phrases that a friend might use to get them to do something. Then ask: What most influences you to follow someone or something? What's your thought process before you decide to do something, either right or wrong? What persuasive techniques do you like to use on others?

Have a family member read aloud Mark 1:16-18. Ask: Why do you think Simon and Andrew followed Jesus? Say: Jesus calls us, through our baptism and God's Word, to follow him and to tell others about him. His Holy Spirit gives us the words that we need to share God's love.

Ask: Why is it important to tell others about Jesus Christ? What are some natural ways to share your faith with your friends? What's difficult or easy about telling others about Jesus?

Close by reading 1 Corinthians 2:1-5. Pray that the Holy Spirit would help each family member share the good news with others.

Adjusting to Junior High

The transition from elementary school to junior high or middle school involves many adjustments for young teenagers. Not the least of which is dealing with increased and varied schoolwork, homework, and grades for multiple classes. What makes the adjustment especially difficult for some kids?

Yvonne Fournier, author of a syndicated education and parenting column, says it has to do with what's expected of kids in junior high. They're now being asked to gather and synthesize information, to process it and make the knowledge their own.

As parents, you can help your kids with the transition by laying ground rules such as looking at homework lists each day. Also, Fournier suggests asking questions that allow your son or

daughter to explain what they're learning in their own words. For example, when you ask your son "what are you reading in English class" don't settle for answers such as "some book." Instead, prompt him to tell you what he's learning or what he finds interesting or uninteresting about the topic.

Fulfilling Family Obligations

As kids get older, their desire to hang out with the "fam" dwindles, while their desire to be with friends increases. This is part of normal adolescent development. That said, how do you convey to your teenagers that family obligations need to be met at times? Try this outline from Dr. Paul Coleman's book *How to Say It to Your Kids* (Prentice Hall Press).

Be clear about expectations. Let kids know ahead of time what's coming up and what you expect them to participate in – no surprises.

Be reasonable. Give kids a chance to opt out of events occasionally.

Empathize. Acknowledge that attending their cousin's wedding might not be their favorite way to spend a Saturday afternoon, but stress that it's important to Aunt Lydia that they do.

Encourage. Recognize kids' cooperative behavior.

Creative Outreach

"Doesn't God want our lives to be His reflection to the world, so they see what heaven is like and therefore want what we have?"

There's no question that life seems to be moving at a faster rate. I realize the seconds tick past at the same speed they always have, but the information assault is greater every year. Thankfully for most people, summer is often the time when they take a vacation to visit relatives or go to some of the great sites in America. There are many reasons why we might take a vacation, but primarily it's to enjoy a little respite or "heaven" on earth. Imagine if you could take people to see what heaven really looks like! How many people would be compelled to do anything it takes to get the ticket to go there? That is the thought behind our value *Creative Outreach!*

We've been looking at the pillar values of Grace. We've looked at *Meaningful Worship* and how "We value prayerful and expressive worship that glorifies God." The second pillar value is *Creative Outreach*, "We value passionate sharing of Jesus Christ with others." Now, in our politically correct world, sharing Jesus Christ with others is not a popular thing to do!

People don't seem to have a problem with us talking about God. Most religions reference "God" or even "Spirit," but when you mention the name "Jesus," you've crossed the politically correct line. After all, who gives you the right to talk about Jesus Christ, when other people believe in "God" in a different way that doesn't include Jesus? Let's go back to John's gospel and get the picture.

Peter and Andrew were disciples of Jesus from Bethsaida. Bethsaida was a fishing village on the north coast of the Sea of Galilee. A third disciple, Philip, also from Bethsaida, completed his research on Jesus and said to Nathanael, "We have found Him of whom Moses in the law, and also the prophets, wrote — Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." This was very politically

incorrect. How could someone say this is the One of whom Moses wrote in the law² and also the prophets? How could Philip be so sure? "Ha!" the world would say.

This wasn't just Philip's opinion or wishful thinking. The word "found" means that he had done his research. It's the same word used in Matthew 2 when Herod said to the wise men, "Go and search carefully for the young Child, and when you have found Him, bring back word to me, that I may come and worship Him also." Because the wise men did their homework, they didn't report back to Herod! It was obvious to Philip he had found the Messiah!

Let me ask you who attend Grace Evangelical Church – have you found the Messiah? Do you know Him? Is He a part of your life? I know the answer. Most of you would say, "Yes, I have <u>found</u> the Messiah – it is Jesus of Nazareth!"

Notice how Philip responded when Nathanael said, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Philip said to him, "Come and see." Notice he didn't argue with Nathanael. He didn't get into an intellectual diatribe. He just said, "Come and see."

Wheeler Mission Provides a Variety of Services

Founded in 1893 in downtown Indianapolis, Wheeler Mission has been providing food, shelter, clothing, rehabilitation services and spiritual direction to the homeless and less fortunate in central Indiana for more than 115 years.

There are currently six different areas of focus at

Wheeler under two main programs: Men's Services, and Women and Children's Services. Men's Services (for which the mission was originally founded) includes short-term shelter, the



Lighthouse Center and Hebron Center at Camp Hunt. Under Women's Services are the Center for Women and Children, and Higher Ground. Annabel's Thrift Shop is also a ministry of Wheeler and is separate from the Women and Children's Services.

Short-term shelter services to homeless men, working poor, and men with physical and mental challenges will provide more than 270,000 meals and 96,000 nights of lodging annually. Medical, dental and optical clinics are also a part of these services. Case management, winter overflow shelter for Indianapolis, and assistance with job and housing procurement round out the short-term services offered.

The Hebron Center at Camp Hunt lies on 285 acres near Bloomington and handles long-term addiction recovery for men and their families plus personal and marital counseling. Hebron Industries is located there and has a woodwork and pallet shop.

The Lighthouse Center focuses on long-term recovery which includes pre-entry and re-entry for men going to and coming from Hebron Center at Camp Hunt. Servant Leadership Training is offered and is a one year program which can lead to state certification as a drug and alcohol addictions counselor.

Women's and Children's Services includes an emergency shelter for homeless women and children where more than 38,000 meals and 25,000 nights of lodging are provided annually. Case management, family and child development services, winter overflow shelter, and life

skills training are also offered.

Higher Ground is a 12 bed facility on the Indianapolis south side that provides long-term substance addiction recovery for women.

Located at 2730 South Madison Avenue, Annabel's Thrift Shop sells good new and used clothing and household items. Profits help to fund Wheeler as it provides

training opportunities for program participants. Those wanting to contribute items will find a convenient donation drop off.

The Grace connection with Wheeler has been long and deep. Several mem-

bers of Grace have or are working here, and the late Bruce Craig was a long-time member of the board of directors. Many have volunteered in a wide variety of ways, as there are numerous volunteer opportunities available. Last year volunteers provided nearly 65,000 hours of service to Wheeler. Current needs for the ministry are disposable razors, deodorant, lotion, socks, and underwear for the Men's Mission.

Philip had found the One sent from heaven – the Anointed One; the One who knew all things. He invited Nathanael to get a glimpse of the One whom heaven sent and in so doing to see not only what *came* from heaven but get a glimpse of *heaven itself!* Come and see what one is like who experiences heaven. Come and see a glimpse of it!

Isn't that all God wants from us? Doesn't God want us to let His life so control ours that we can invite people in for a glimpse of one⁵ sent from heaven? Doesn't God want our lives to be His reflection to the world, so they see what heaven is like and therefore want what we have?

Isn't that really the whole concept of "heaven on earth" – when Jesus rules in our lives? It's not really a comfortable life, plush surroundings, or abundance of things that reveal heaven. It's God's life lived through us, with us, and in us that He designs so we can tell the world, "Come and see – see what heaven is like!" Because each of us is so unique, we can be very creative in our outreach. From the Pastor's Desk

 $\textbf{What Baptists Believe} \ (\text{part 2 of 3}) \ \text{by Rev. Harold Trinier-from } \textit{The Canadian Baptist}$

3. The Freedom of the Individual

Baptists believe that "where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty" and this liberty, sometimes called "soul liberty," extends to each individual child of God. Salvation is for "everyone that believeth" and salvation is an individual experience and an individual's personal responsibility.

Each person is a free moral agent, made in the divine image, and so is morally responsible to God. Each individual must be free to believe or not to believe in God, to obey or to disobey Him, to worship or not to worship Him, according to the dictates of his own conscience.

While insisting on the right to worship God according to the dictates of their conscience, Baptists have also insisted on this right for others -- even those who may hold very different beliefs and follow different practices.

4. A Regenerate Church Membership

For Baptists the Church of Jesus Christ is made up of only those who personally and individually confess Jesus Christ to be Lord and Master of their lives and have, by their own faith, been born into the family of God and the fellowship of other believers on Jesus Christ.

Baptists maintain that prerequisite to church membership is a personal experience in the life of the individual of the Holy Spirit's regenerative work brought about by the faith and obedience of the individual. On this fundamental principle rests the Baptist conception of the "gathered" church.

5. The Baptism of Believers Only

Baptists believe that the two ordinances of the Christian Church are the baptism by immersion in water of believers only and the partaking of the Lord's Supper.

Baptism by immersion in water of the believer in Jesus Christ is a solemn and initiatory act of obedience symbolizing in the experience of the believer the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus Christ and his own putting off of the old nature's, his death to self and past sins and rising in newness of life to live and serve Jesus Christ.

Baptism is a confession of faith and an act of obedience on the part of the individual believer. It is an act which no one can contract for another. Like regeneration it has to do with the individual and his own faith and commitment.

For this reason Baptists oppose, as having no Scriptural warrant, the baptism of infants and children incapable of personal belief and commitment. Instead they frequently hold services for the dedication of parents and children to the end and with the prayerful hope that Christ may be so honoured in the home and His teachings so faithfully set forth that when the children come to the age of discretion they may voluntarily and of their own free choice make their own personal commitment of themselves to Christ and confess Him in believer's baptism.

Focus on Worship A. Outreach

I had a chance to take part in a chapel service at Riverside Retirement Home with Pastor David. It is great to be able to reach out and support the seniors who need fellowship and worship. I plan to continue this important ministry with the leading of Pastor David. I also have the opportunity to help the Westview Food Cupboard during the summer months. This is another worthwhile ministry which reaches out to the physical and spiritual needs of the less fortunate.

In the areas of worship, I was able to attend the planning meetings of the upcoming services and activities. It is great to see so many people with talents and gifts putting them into practice.

We use the word "worship" so many times, but what is worship? What is its function? What is our part in it? Have you ever asked yourself these questions?

A quick Bible study reveals that Biblical worship includes various types of music from singing (Psalm 66:4) to various instruments (Psalm 150:3-5), but worship is not just about music. It is useless to worship if we do not direct it or focus it on God. After all, worship connects our spirit with His spirit. Worship encompasses spiritual prayer and spiritual singing with understanding (I Corinthians 14:15).

Worship starts with God's revelation, pointing to and celebrating Christ, and continues with our response of reverence, joy and boldness. When this happens our whole person is involved—our mind, heart, emotions—our whole physical and spiritual being.

Worship is not only about our person, it involves two kinds of relationships—vertical with the Divine and horizontal with fellow humans. Therefore, we must be active in the act of worship, not passive. After all, true worshippers are participators, not spectators.

Finally, worship affects all areas of our life—worship is a lifestyle. We should live our lives as an act of worship. Regardless of our professions, duties, hobbies, etc., we have opportunities to worship. At the same time, worship is a also a very special time, in which we set time apart to meet with our God, hear His revelation and respond accordingly to Him.



THE SOUL LOVER

Prolific hymn writer Charles Wesley wrote the moving song "Jesus, Lover of My Soul" in 1739. According to one story, Wesley penned the lyrics after surviving a raging storm at sea. A frightened bird apparently flew into Wesley's window during the uproar, seeking safety in the folds of Wesley's coat. The first stanza is as follows:

Jesus, lover of my soul, let me to thy bosom fly, while the nearer waters roll, while the tempest still is high, Hide me, O my Savior, hide, till the storm of life is past; safe into the haven guide; O receive my soul at last.

This brings to mind the frightened disciples in Matthew 8:23-27. Pummeled with wind and waves, they feared drowning and called to Jesus to save them. We, too, can take refuge in our Savior during life's storms, knowing we have a safe haven and a sure destination.

Have you ever seen a community come alive? If you live in a Northern state, you know what I mean. People have been



FRESH ENCOUNTER

BREATHING FRESH AIR INTO YOUR PRAYER LIFE

Lectio Divina (Latin for "Sacred Word") is a way to meditate on Scripture by listening and then responding—breathing

in God's Word and breathing out a prayer. Traditionally, this practice includes four parts: reading, meditation, prayer, and contemplation. Deep listening to Scripture requires a focus on God's words rather than ours. In Lectio Divina, you listen to what God wants to say just to you through the text. You're open to listening not just to general truth that's applicable to everyone, but for specific truth that applies to your unique circumstances.

Try it. Read a short passage of Scripture slowly, noticing which word seems to jump off the page. Spend a few moments in silence. Do this several times, looking for God's invitation or encouragement in

the word he seems to be highlighting. Reflect on the word or phrase-- listen for God's invitation. Be quiet-- let that word draw you into prayer, into wordless companionship with God. At Acts 29's Fresh Encounter on Tuesday and



Thursday mornings at 8 a.m., we are practicing Lectio Divina by praying through 1st, 2nd and 3rd John. After we listen to God on our own, we share what God showed us through corporate prayer. This fellowship with God and His family on His terms often opens the day with a sweet aroma. My prayer is that you, too, can experience this fellowship with God through this simple, timeless spiritual discipline. — Pastor John

It Takes a Village...

It has often been said, "It takes a village to raise a child." After the last few months at Acts 29, I have seen a slight variation of this phrase: "It takes a village to mourn a loss." Over the past few months, people within the body of Acts 29 have had to grieve the loss of three loved ones. Two of those deaths were violent and senseless and the other was due to a destructive and

painful disease. Our body has had the privilege to learn what it means to live out the verse found in Romans 12:15, "Rejoice with those who rejoice; mourn with those who



mourn." I have witnessed the love of Christ being poured out and holding up those who are grieving. This love is seen by a simple phone call, a hug of encouragement, and a visit with a listening ear and open heart. Our people are taking up their responsibility and surrounding these loved ones, and in the process, the walls of hostility and brokenness are coming down.

A few days after a woman's son was brutally killed, she came to church. She told me that she wanted to be around her brothers and sisters in the Lord. Tears came down my face as I saw this dear woman standing in the back of our

sanctuary praising the Lord, and my heart rejoiced that she was not standing alone. Another woman was standing and holding her up in support and escorting her right into the throne room of grace. My heart rejoices as I see our adults rallying in this time of need, but my heart also hurts knowing that there are still so many people in our city who have to mourn alone. My prayer for our adults and for you is that we continue to look for those in our community, whether we know them or not, and surround them with the love of Christ. That's a village I want to live in, because Christ lives in a village like that.

Recently I was visiting the home

of one of my ESL students. As this was my first visit to his house, I was

introduced to his entire familybrothers, sisters, children, cousins, and parents. As I greeted them all, I was struck by the frail condition of his father. He looked more like a skeleton than a man as he sat at the dining room table, struggling to breathe with the help of an oxygen tank. I knew that he did not know Christ and that he would soon die without Him. I also knew that the language barrier that existed

between us prevented me from sharing the message of Christ. It was a heart-breaking moment. This old man is a representation of the thousands of people who make up the international community of Hamtramck. Separated from the Christian community by culture and language, they do not have much opportunity to learn of the hope of Christ.

Yet, this summer. God has given the people of Acts 29 a bridge into the international community. The Detroit Workforce Development Department has asked us to provide English-as-a-Second-Language classes to some of their clients, bringing over 50 people from four different ethnic groups into our ministry. Not only will we have an opportunity to meet their physical need to learn English, but we will also have a platform from which to build trusting friendships that will last beyond the summer. Pray that through these friendships, God will provide opportunities to share the hope of Peter Hoffman Christ.


For many weeks the eight study teams and the Building Committee have been reviewing and revising the original conceptual floor plans for our renovations and the new building. Concerns have included: What will the results look like? How useable will they be? Will the space be flexible if uses change in the future? How do we control the cost? Can the spaces be used for different purposes, groups, and activities?

Architect Dan Stauder will complete the Design & Development drawings and renderings in May. Also during May several meetings will be held:

- The Building Committee will meet to review the progress of the drawings and to discuss various aspects of the financing of the expansion.
- Four informational sessions will be available for our members to see the architect's drawings and renderings, hear updates on the project, and ask questions. All sessions will be in the MPR. The entire LCR family is urged to attend one of the informational meetings so that we are fully informed and to spare the Voter's Assembly the questions which could be addressed in the information meetings.

• The Building Committee will meet again later in the month with the architect for its last review of the plans and to prepare for the upcoming Voter's Meeting.





Voters will hear a presentation by the architect and the Building Committee, hear a plan for possible funding, discuss a motion submitted by the MMLT, and make a decision regarding the renovations and new building. Periodic updates will be posted on bulletin boards in the Narthex and in the weekly *Messenger* throughout May. Members of the Building Committee and staff can share some of the challenges and the progress.

The Homes that Love Built—Bethlehem Lutheran Church, St. Louis



LCEF "On the Move" has regularly featured the story of Bethlehem Lutheran Church in North St. Louis and its endeavors to literally rebuild the community surrounding the church. To date, they have built 39 new houses in the neighborhood. The church has also been responsible for the rehabilitation of other homes and other developers are now following the lead of the church and have added 70 new homes to the neighborhood.

The homes built by Better Living Communities have been primarily financed by tax credits awarded by the Missouri Housing Development Commission (MHDC). All homes previously built have been rented under a lease-to-purchase arrangement and all homes are currently occupied. Because of its sterling track record, MHDC has awarded Better Living Communities sufficient tax credits to build an additional eighteen homes. All will be three-bedroom homes, designed for family living.

God continues to bless the efforts of Bethlehem Lutheran church. Resurrection and LCEF are privileged to be partnered with Bethlehem in this ambitious plan to rebuild and minister to the local community.

The Challenge to Live a Complaint-Free Life

While attending undergraduate school, I had a professor who told us how he had been labeled by a teacher. It was on his permanent record. It read, "Clinton is a chronic spitter." How many of us remember being threatened by having something put in our permanent record? I often wondered how real the threat was. As you think about your whole life, what is it that would bother you to know was included in your permanent record?

But thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. 1 Corinthians 15:57 (NIV)

But thanks be to God, who always leads us in triumphal procession in Christ and through us spreads everywhere the fragrance of the knowledge of him. 2

Corinthians 2:14 (NIV)

Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift! 2 Corinthians 9:15 (NIV)

In ancient times, the ink that was used did not contain the acid that would make it permanent. The ink wasn't able to stain the paper. Peter's sermon recorded in Acts 3 describes God's ability to wipe out our sins. It's just like wiping the ink off the page, erasing them from the ol' black board, wiping them off the white board, deleting from smart board. Whichever generation you are from, the idea is that we turn from sin.

Repent, then, and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out, that times of refreshing may come from the Lord, Acts 3:19 (NIV)

Back to Clinton . . . What came to your mind when you read that Clinton was a "chronic spitter." Clinton as a child has a severe lisp in his speech. When he spoke spittle would often spray out of his mouth. This impression is quite a bit different from a child who spits on others just to be nasty.

During Lent, I challenged the congregation to give up something. Really, the challenge is beyond Lent. It is for your daily living. Like Clinton, some people's permanent record could read,

"(insert your name) is a chronic complainer."

We all laughed at the quote, "Complaining is likened to bad breath. We notice it when it comes out of someone else's mouth, but not when it comes from our own."

The exercise of going 21 days without complaining allows us to focus on the life we have in Christ that celebrates the blessings of life. The world that sees Christians as chronic complainers is not to God's glory. Also, in the Church, chronic complaining tears down, it doesn't build up. As a pastor, I often have people from other churches come and complain to me about everything wrong with their church. Somewhere, somehow, the joy of their salvation--the message of Christ--is lost in their complaining.

Many of you took the challenge with great enthusiasm but became disheartened and gave up. Let me encourage you. On average it can take six months to accomplish this, maybe longer. By the way, at this point in time, I know of only one member who has accomplished 21 straight days without complaining.

We want to be a positive influence for Christ, whether at church, at home, at school, or at work. The complaint-free challenge is simply an attitude check which makes for more positive relationships and a positive witness for the atoning work of Christ who has wiped out our sins.

Peter says, "Repent!" Nobody wants to be known as "chronic spitter." No one wants to be known as a "chronic complainer." And no one wants to be around a chronic complainer. This doesn't mean we can't address what's wrong in the world. It just directs us in a positive way to move toward a solution. It's too easy to complain and do nothing. Instead, we have so much to be thankful for when we live for Him. How much is there to really complain about?

This is Marilis Bolivar, our dedicated bookkeeper and long-time employee. Hers is a story of faith, growth, strength, and fulfillment of goals that she never dreamed was possible.

In the summer of 2001, Marilis began working at the farm as a general clean-up person. Her first job was raking leaves. She was very shy and probably uttered only three or four words. As she progressed, she started conversing more, started "rooting" plants and became responsible for the potted plants. During this time she attended the daily devotional and started taking adult confirmation classes. We should mention that she was confirmed and a member of Bethel Lutheran at Rio Chiquito, and went through a reaffirmation service at the farm.

Dale started talking to her about her faith and life. Marilis has three boys, no husband, and they all lived with her parents. Her dream was to have a house of her own, but she knew that it was impossible.

As Marilis' confidence grew, she became more animated and started to share her faith in God with others. At about this time Marilis was asked to work in the office. We had to teach her how to file. It was a slow process, but little by little she became proficient in the areas she was responsible for. Marilis has run the office finances for the past two years. She prepares monthly reports and is responsible for all cash flow at the farm.

Then the impossible happened! Marilis saved enough money to build her own house. She thanks God for giving her the opportunity to learn and to raise her standard of living. She doesn't thank the farm—it was only a vessel used by God. Now when we get discouraged, guess who bolsters us up with God's Words of promise and guidance! Her younger sister has been confirmed and is active in the church at Rio Chiquito. Her entire family is becoming involved in the Lord's work, too.

Prayers work! We heard from several of you who were praying for a spiritual leader and God blessed us with Rafael as a vicar to work with the farm area. Please keep praying that Rafael will stay strong and firm in his faith and the teaching he will be doing.

The economy is suffering and we are still having a hard time just getting wages paid. Dale's pickup was in an accident, so is unusable and the tractor broke down with no parts available.

We have been able to do more fencing on the farm and we are building a new sheep and goat barn in the last few weeks. More time is being spent in assisting Rafael with the evangelism outreach. We are looking forward to seeing many of you while on furlough this summer.

Thanks to Concordia Lutheran in North Dakota for their unselfish sharing and prayers; to Ascension in Florida for their continued caring and sharing; to St. Mark's LWML for continuing to slip us in their annual budget every year. And thanks to our own congregation, Lutheran Church of the Resurrection, for their continued concern for our people in Venezuela. Also, thanks to all the people who have contributed to sustaining the farm. A special thanks goes to World Relief and Missions of LCMS.

Missional Moment

One question that was asked when I was interviewed by the Call Committee last year was, "How do you change the DNA of a congregation to become more mission and outreach focused?" I am not sure of my answer then, but my answer now would be to "focus on the Next Generation."

When you are teaching youth to be missional, you, in turn, will become more missional. One of the greatest ways to learn anything is to teach it to someone else. When you reach out to others to show your children, grandchildren, friends, and members of the community what it looks like to be missional, you will become more missional yourself and will instill in the youth of the Next Generation a missional heart.

So the question is, how can we equip the Next Generation to be more missional? What can we do with them now that will be the building block that they can model throughout their lives? The following list is adapted from survey data compiled by Dr. Jeff Myers, Ph.D of www.passingthebaton.org.

Look for opportunities to serve together as a family.

- The building committee or "The Plan" has many projects around the church that can be done by families ... pick one to complete together.
- Taking Jesus to the Streets is a GREAT way to show your children to know and love other cultures. They will have a BLAST!

Serve in your own community as you prepare for missions opportunities elsewhere.

- Be genuinely interested in the people you meet —even the ones from next door!
- Make cards and send them to missionaries, Like |P and Aimee Cima or Dale and Sandy Saville.
- Make food for a food kitchen or collect food for Feed My People.
- Exercise hospitality in your home.

Give of what God has given to you.

- A mother writes, "Have kids give money to missions and let them research and decide on their own (with some guidance) where they give. We have our kids give 25% of their allowance. They have bought chickens, goats and bees for poor people. One of their dreams is to buy a water buffalo-really!" See www.mission.lcms.org or search the gift catalog under "Ways to Give" at www.worldvision.org.
- Have a missionary offering jar-put change in and periodically give the money to a mission's cause, with the family's input.
- Encourage your children to prayerfully give things that belong to them to those on the mission field.

Pray.

- Make a missions-focused phrase a constant part of your family prayer time.
- Encourage family members to pray that God will use them in His Kingdom.
- Pray every day for your children that God will prepare them for the future He desires and that He will use them to expand His Kingdom for His glory. Let them hear you pray it, too.

Communicate. Use today's technology to stay in close touch with those around the world.

- Encourage children to e-mail missionary families (especially kids) and do projects for them here at home (making phone calls, sending letters, etc.).
- Send packages to the children especially on their birthdays.

Get to know missionaries personally.

- Make your home a place where missionaries on furlough or passing through the area can stay.
- Invite visiting missionaries to your home for a meal.
- When you invite missionaries over, ask the children to prepare a list of questions so they'll have something to talk about.

Read biographies and watch videos about missionaries.

- Check out missionaries' lives and what they are doing at http://mission.lcms.org.
- Check out videos about missions on websites such as Christian Cinema.

Go! Of all of the ideas folks wrote about, this one is clearly most important. Folks raved about the powerful benefits their families received by participating in missions trips.

- When you go on a family mission trip, encourage each child to "earn" their own way. When they earn the money needed, they develop a greater appreciation for what it means when missionaries "raise their own support" and they get more out of the actual experience.
- Start with simple trips and move toward progressively more intense experiences. Start with Taking Jesus to the Street and slowly build toward trips like Vietnam.





May 8 is the final J-High dance for this school year.





SOARING SPIRIT MINISTRIES LAUNCHES "SPIRIT STAFFING" TO HELP EX-OFFENDERS FIND MEANINGFUL EMPLOYMENT

St. Louis area churches have a new resource to support their ministry to ex-offenders in their congregations.

Lutheran Foundation of St. Louis and Wheat Ridge Ministries have partnered with Soaring Spirit Ministries to establish Spirit Staffing, an employment staffing agency working specifically to help previously incarcerated individuals find meaningful employment. Spirit Staffing is teaming with the St. Louis business community to help exoffenders receive employment counseling, valuable on-the-job training and education through temporary-to-permanent job placement.

In Missouri alone, approximately 20,000 ex-offenders are released every year, but of those who return to prison within 12 months of release, 38% are unemployed at the time of re-incarceration. Employment through Spirit Staffing will offer these individuals the opportunity to make positive life-changes that will

restore their lives financially, practically, emotionally and spiritually.

Remember those who are in prison, as though in prison with them, and those who are mistreated, since you also are in the body.

Hebrews 13:3

Founded in 1997, the mission of Soaring Spirit Ministries is "Healing broken lives through Jesus Christ," sharing Christ's unconditional love and forgiveness with men and women who have spent time in prison. Helping these men and women whose lives have been broken by crime and incar-

ceration gain self-esteem, see their self-worth as members of society, stay free from prison and pursue a higher quality of life is the major purpose of the organization.
