Look at this list of names and tell me what they all have in common: George Washington, Al Jolson, Margaret Thatcher, Roger Bannister & Neil Armstrong

Do you see the connection? They all have this thing in common: each person was the "first" in some category ... the first person to do something special or unique. Those five people are the first on the moon, the first to run a sub-4-minute mile, the first person's voice ever heard over a "talking picture," the first female prime minister of the United Kingdom, and the first president of the United States. By the way, if you don't already know which is which, you can have some fun family conversation time over the dinner table, trying to find out who can match up those "firsts" correctly. Now I want to add to your list another special first; Jesus' first appearance after the resurrection.

What difference would it make to be the first to see Jesus after the resurrection? Why would it matter? Hundreds of people saw Jesus after His resurrection. Wouldn't each person be equally blessed to see Jesus alive again? Wouldn't every follower be ecstatic with new-found hope and joy to see that Jesus had risen?

Perhaps, but let me ask it this way: how would you feel if YOU were the one who was chosen by Jesus to be the VERY FIRST ONE that he revealed himself to, in His newly risen body? Not James, not John, not Peter ... but you! Not to the soldiers ... not to Pilate ... not even to the high priest ... but to YOU. Of all the people Jesus could have chosen to reveal himself to FIRST, so that for all of history, your name would be at the top of the list of the most significant events that ever occurred. How would that kind of an awesome blessing strike you? In order for you to know what that would be like, you would have to imagine yourself standing in the sandals of Mary Magdalene, because the first appearance of Jesus after his resurrection was to her.

Who was this privileged woman, chosen by Jesus to be blessed by his first appearing? We know from her title, Mary Magdalene, that she was in some way associated with the city of Magdala. Magdala was a rather populous town on the coast of Galilee about three miles from Capernaum. It was a city of commerce (a port city) and a city known for its textiles and dye works. She could have been called "Magdalene" because she was born or lived most of her life there, or it could have been because she made her wealth there. Luke 8:1-3 tells us that Mary and some other women were helping to support Jesus and the disciples out of their own means. If she were a wealthy woman who had "made her millions," so to speak, in Magdala, then that could explain why

## Why Do We Dye?

OK, by a show of hands: how many of you catch a whiff of cider vinegar and instantly think of Easter egg dye? I remember vividly my mother boiling a

large pot of eggs every Good Friday for us to color. It's a tradition I still enjoy.

Like so many holiday traditions, the origin of Easter eggs is somewhat unclear. A search of several internet sites revealed a smattering of fact and opinion; but one common consensus is that the first use of eggs in holy day traditions trace back to Pagan times. Before the egg became closely entwined with the Christian Easter, it was honored during many rite-of-Spring festivals. The egg represented the rebirth of the earth. The long, hard winter was over; the earth burst forth and was reborn just as the egg miraculously burst forth with life. The egg, therefore, was believed to have special powers. It was buried under the foundations of buildings to ward off evil and given to newlyweds to step on when entering their home as a new couple. The Romans, Gauls, Chinese, Egyptians and Persians all cherished the egg as a symbol of the universe. From ancient times eggs were dyed, exchanged, and shown reverence.

As was common practice centuries ago, the leaders of the Catholic church started replacing pagan traditions with their own, often adding new meanings to old symbols and festivals in order to further the spread of Christianity. Pope Gregory the Great (540-604 AD) ordered his missionaries to do just that, and the Christian celebration of the Resurrection of Christ seemed ideally suited to replace the pagan feast of "Eostre." Many of the traditions were adopted into church festivities, beginning the Christian observation of the Easter Holy Day. Pope Gregory was admired by John Calvin, who declared that Gregory was "the last good pope."

The practice spread throughout the world and was flavored by local beliefs. Polish legends surrounding eggs blended folklore and fact. One such tale speaks of when Mary Magdalene went to the sepulcher to anoint the body of Jesus. She had with her a basket of eggs to serve as a repast. When she arrived at the sepulcher and uncovered the eggs, the pure white shells had miraculously taken on a rainbow of colors. Traditionally, Russian Orthodox Easter eggs were dyed red to represent the blood of Christ shed on the cross. The hard shell of the egg symbolized the sealed Tomb of Christ the cracking of which symbolized his resurrection from the dead. Although the omens and the mystery of the egg have disappeared today, the symbolism remains, and artists continue in the old

world tradition of adorning eggs.

The most famous decorated Easter eggs were those made by the well-known goldsmith, Peter Carl Faberge. In 1883 the Russian Czar, Alexander, commissioned Faberge to make a special Easter gift for his wife, the Empress Marie. This special Faberge egg so delighted the Czarina that the Czar promptly ordered the Faberge firm to design further eggs to be delivered every Easter. In later years Nicholas II, Alexander's son, continued the custom. Fifty-seven eggs were made in all, and are today nearly priceless artifacts. In 2002, one sold for a record 9.2 million dollars.

Today, the dying and hunting of Easter eggs is a popular celebration throughout the world. Even the President of the United States gets in on the act every Easter with a White House Egg Hunt. But the big question IS...what do you do with all those boiled eggs afterward? The uses of boiled eggs seem fairly limited to deviled eggs and egg/tuna/ chicken salad. I am a fan of the traditional deviled egg; but every now and then, I like to spice things up. Here are a few variations on the old stand-by; why not try one out this year? These recipes and more like them can be found on the website www.allrecipes.com.

Each of these recipes is for one dozen boiled eggs. Simply cool and peel the eggs and then slice in half. Spoon out yolks and mash with fork, together with other ingredients listed. Pipe or spoon egg filling back into boiled whites.

## Deviled Ham Eggs

Deviled Ham and eggs; perfect together! Buy deviled ham in the canned meat section of your grocery store. Do not attempt to substitute "potted meat product;" it looks the same, but it's NOT.

- 1 (4.5 ounce) can deviled ham
- 1 tablespoon spicy brown mustard
- 1/4 cup mayonnaise
- 1 pinch black pepper
- 24 slices black olives
- Paprika for sprinkling

## Creamy Ranch Eggs

Cream cheese gives an extra richness to these zippy eggs

- 1/3 cup Ranch-style salad dressing
- 1/2 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 dill pickle, finely chopped




## Bacon and Cheese Eggs

Friendships remind me of the flowers in my garden. There is an incredible variety even within each type of plant. Each is a unique creation and brings wonderful color and fragrance. Some need lots of sunshine, some need shade, others like lots of water and some only a little. Some, like my lilies, bloom only for a day. 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# How God Sees Them

I work with children who are severely disabled. They will never walk, they will never talk more than a few words (if that), and they will never be potty trained. Their bodies, as crippled as they appear, will continue to mature and grow... but their brains cannot keep up. They lack the ability to say "I love you" and "thank you" to their daddy and mommy. They lack the ability to say "I need a drink," or "my tummy hurts."

Every day I walk into a building filled with children who have special needs. In my classroom there are seven: James, Rachelle, Rose, Charles, Ann, Marie, and Elise. Each one is different in their needs, abilities, moods and personalities... but they all have this in common: they were all lovingly created by God. I have the privilege of changing their diapers, feeding them through tubes, and playing with them! Some-

times my heart aches for them and the many things they will never be able to do; but I know that God made them with a meaning and a purpose. Maybe it's to teach *others* something?

Last night I had a dream about some of the kids I work with. Rachelle was running around a back yard playing and smiling and bouncing a ball. No wheelchair, no special shoes to make her feet grow correctly- just her acting like a healthy, growing child. Then there was 7-year-old James, riding down the street on his bike, instead of a wheelchair. He called my name and laughed as he came towards me for a hug.

I believe that God gave me this dream so that I will see the children in wheel-chairs the way He sees them. When people see me out in public with one of my students, I get a lot of funny looks. They silently say, "I'm glad I don't have

your job" or "God bless you- I could never have the patience for a kid like that." That's only because they see the outside; they see the chair and the breathing tubes and the lack of response from the child's face. If they could see inside—what God sees—they might feel differently. They might feel blessed to work with a child like this, or even to parent a child like this.

Today I saw my students a little more like God sees them. I could imagine them running, playing, and laughing like healthy non-handicapped children. Without that dream from God, I may have never been able to! I left my job crying today. One day in Heaven, all these dear ones will walk and run and laugh and express themselves in a way they never could on earth. They will be whole in God's presence- the way He has always seen them.

she was called Mary Magdalene. In addition, she is not mentioned in connection with a husband, or described as someone's mother, so it is also likely that she was described by the town of Magdala because she did not have a marriage relationship that would otherwise be her "title."

Because Mary Magdalene is first mentioned in Luke 8, right after the story of an unnamed woman of sinful reputation who anointed Jesus' feet, many have tried to say that the unnamed prostitute of Luke 7 is actually Mary Magdalene of Luke 8. The poor reputation of the city of Magdala (a seaman's hangout) and the fact that Mary had once been demon possessed is cited as substantiating evidence that Mary Magdalene was this ex-prostitute; but there really is not enough evidence to make this assumption. There are some legitimate assumptions we can make, though. We can assume that she was most likely well-off, that she was probably unmarried, and that she was definitely a woman whose transformation was extreme, from being a demoniac to a passionately devoted follower of Jesus Christ.

Do we have good reason to speak highly of Mary Magdalene? Can we really know for certain that she was a passionately devoted follower of Christ? Well, let's consider the evidence. Her financial contribution would seem to indicate this in part, since we rarely invest large sums of money with no hope of a financial return, unless we believe strongly in the cause. And her presence at the cross would also speak volumes about her dedication to Christ. How many of the disciples were at the cross as Jesus was being crucified? Was Peter there? Was James there? What about Nathaniel or Philip or Thomas? We have no record of those men being there. John was the only one of the apostles who was there. Along with him, there were a number of women, including Mary Magdalene. But why was she there, risking the damaging association and the possible harm? For this reason: her love for her Savior was no pragmatic fancy. She may not have understood why he died and she may have even struggled with doubts that many of Christ's followers were undoubtedly facing. But nevertheless, she was there. She had faith in this man, Jesus, even as he hung there dying on the cross. She was a passionately devoted follower of Christ.

The example of Mary is quite convicting, I must admit. Do I, like Mary Magdalene, love Jesus without reservation? Do I trust

my soul into his hands, no matter what the future may hold? I must be able to answer this question with a resounding, "Yes!" My eternal future rests on my answer to that question. The direction of my entire life on this earth will unfold with my answer.

Mary Magdalene was there as they nailed him to the cross. She was there and saw him die. She saw the legs of the other men broken, and she saw as Jesus' side was pierced. She was there as Nicodemus and Joseph (from Aramathea) took Jesus' body from the place of crucifixion and carried it to a burial cave that had been recently cut, quickly preparing his body for the tomb. She saw that he was not adequately prepared and that the task would need to be completed later, after the Sabbath. She left the tomb as one of the very few who actually saw his form disappear behind the massive rock that covered his "final resting place." She was a complete witness to his death and his burial. And she made plans with the other ladies to return after the Sabbath, to bring the spices and to give one last honor to Jesus, by completing the preparation of his body for the tomb.

# "I have seen the Lord! I know He is alive!"


On Sunday morning, Mary Magdalene was the first to go to the tomb. Other women went to the tomb that morning as well, but Mary Magdalene arrived while it was still dark according to John 20. The other women came soon after the sun had risen, but by that time Mary Magdalene had seen the empty tomb and had gone to tell Peter and John about it. She either did not see the angels or God hadn't sent them yet, because when she returned to proclaim what she saw, she made no mention of angels. Peter and John had a foot race to the tomb, and Mary followed along behind; so far behind that the two men had come and gone before her second arrival at the tomb. The others had received the message of the angels. Peter, John and even the other women had come to the tomb and heard the message of the angels that Jesus was alive. But Mary did not know of this message of hope yet. John 20 tells us that Mary Magdalene, still weeping and crying, stooped over to look into the tomb. At that point, she saw the angels. They were dressed in white and were sitting down, one at the head of the empty death-wrap, and one at the foot. She had seen the cloths lying there herself a couple days earlier, filled with the body of Jesus, but this time they were empty.

The angels who looked like young men said, "Woman, why are you crying?" She answered, "Because they have taken my Lord, and I don't know where they have put him."

Even as she said these words, Jesus was standing behind her. As she turned around, she did not recognize who he was in much the same way that the two men on the road to Emmaus did not recognize the resurrected Jesus. Her heart of love for her Lord Jesus who had died was breaking, and her sadness was now compounded by the thought that someone had hideously and cruelly taken his body from the tomb in which he had been laid to rest in peace. Jesus spoke to her: "Woman, why are you crying? Who are you seeking?" She thought that he was the groundskeeper and asked him, "Sir, if you have taken him away, tell me where he is and I will take care of his body." Jesus then replied simply, "Mary." Jesus once said, "I call my sheep by name and they know my voice." So it was with Mary Magdalene, because when he called her by name she knew it was Jesus, alive and standing before her. She grasped hold of him and cried out, "Rabboni!" meaning "my Master!" Jesus then told her not to attempt to hold on to him, because he was not going to remain on earth, but was going to return to the Father. So she let go and went on her way, again with a message to share. The first message she had earlier that morning was a confused message of despair, but this time the message was an exuberant message: "I have seen the Lord and He is alive!"

And this dear woman was the FIRST ever to utter those words, "I have seen the Lord. I know He is alive!" Before Jesus was done, he would have revealed himself to well over 500 people; but Jesus chose to reveal himself to Mary before everyone else. Why did the Lord reveal himself to Mary first? What could have been his motivation? We cannot speak authoritatively ... to say that we know for sure the reason for this FIRST AP-PEARING. But we do know that his first appearing was only the beginning. The resurrected Jesus has been disclosing himself to millions of people for thousands of years. His resurrection life has been the symbol of the eternal life, purchased on the cross, for everyone who believes.

This year, as we celebrate resurrection Sunday, consider this question: What difference does the resurrection make? Am I echoing Mary's words, "I have seen the Lord. I know He is alive!"?



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## CHECKING IN WITH PASTOR JIM

## What is wrong with me?

Do you ever ask yourself that question when you find yourself failing or lacking the strength in the times of difficulties? Proverbs 24:10 says, "If you are slack in the day of distress your strength is limited." The proverb is simply teaching that when we fail during the trials of life we lack strength. Do you find yourself lacking strength? So what's the spiritual solution? Proverb 10:5-6 says, "A wise man is strong, and a man of knowledge increases power. For by wise guidance you will wage war, and in abundance of counselors there is victory." Remember there are always spiritual battles going on around us. We are constantly in a state of war, Spiritual War. Though Christ has given us victory through the cross, we are still called to fight and be faithful through the hard

times. We are called to remain strong to "Fight the good fight" (I Timothy 6:12). We are called to remain strong because the strength that we are given comes from God. 1 John 4:4 says, "Ye are of God, little children, and have overcome them: because greater is he that is in you, than he that is in the world."

If our strength comes from God then why do we still fail under trials? Where does it all go wrong for most of us? Without sounding two simplistic, our lack of strength is attributed to: 1) our lack of God's knowledge and wisdom. James 1:5 teaches us that we are to ask for wisdom when going through difficult times. 2) our willingness to take advice from others that are not following God's Word. Chapter one of 1 John teaches us that if we walk in darkness or seek out the world's wavs we cannot have fellowship with God, the source of our strength. How many of

you would fast for one week before a big marathon you wanted to win? You would probably not have the physical strength to even begin the race because the source of your physical strength is food. Your source of all strength is God. Without proper fellowship you will be weak and will fail when trials come. Close fellowship with God is the key to your strength. The closer you are with God the more you will thirst for His knowledge and wisdom, and the stronger you will become.

Sin is the cancer that will rob us of spiritual strength and leave us wondering. "What is wrong with me?" If you're caught in the same trap you only need to seek the knowledge of God that says, "If we confess our sins He is faithful and righteous to forgive our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteous" (I John 1:9).

## **Pray for the Persecuted**

Someone living in China or Africa may seem a world away, literally. But for believers, we have family literally all over the world. Many of these brothers and sisters are suffering intense persecution of a type we cannot even imagine here in America. This persecution has risen to new heights and those of us in safer parts of the world must pray, pray, pray for the safety of those affected. Still, Satan cannot thwart the effect the truths of scripture; as is often the case, Christianity continues to spread in these areas despite the opposition.

In February, violence erupted in Nigeria as Muslim gangs attacked Christians and destroyed churches over the results of a recent election. In China, more than 400 Christian college students in Beijing were arrested in November of last year and interrogated about their beliefs. Four leaders of house churches were sentenced to "re-education" through labor for one to one and a half years. A report from Mexico City in December of 2008 shows that as the number of evangelical Christians in southern Mexico has grown, hostilities from "traditionalist Catholics" have kept pace. Especially in indigenous communities in southern Mexico, the prevailing attitude is that only traditionalist Catholics, who blend native rituals with Roman Catholicism, have rights to religious practice, according to news reports. Moreover, the reports indicate the traditionalist Catholic villagers believe they have the right to force others to conform to their religion. Those that do not have been jailed, fined, and threatened with depravation of basic services such as water and electricity.

Pakistan, India, Iran, Vietnam, Iraq, Belarus, Africa: all across the globe Christians are forced to meet in secret to do what we take for granted every Sunday.
