A former native of Minnesota, he and his wife Lisa and their three children live in the Mission District of San Francisco.

In addition to Mark Scandrette, The Renew weekend will also feature a local musician and worship leader to create a space in which we can encounter God in a rich and authentic way. Her name is Heatherlyn. She is an acoustic singer song artist with a Soul - Roots - Rock vibe from Minneapolis. She was selected as a Midwest Regional Finalist and awarded the Midwest "People's Choice" of NPR's Mountain Stage Performance Contest. Her soulful, honest voice resonates with people from various walks of life. Refreshing, whimsical, deeply authentic and faith-filled, her music will call us to deeper thoughtfulness about life and love, and our purpose in the world. The schedule for the weekend is:







Dealing with distractions in the Office

Five o'clock, the end of your day. You were busy; you achieved some good things. Still, too much of the day was unproductive. Tasks that should have been done were not. Low priority tasks somehow edged out those of more value.



What could have been done differently? What actions would have produced better results? Time management is a complex subject. 
Weed out unnecessary tasks

The highlight and the driving force behind the tour was the invitation that the choirs received to sing the service of Choral Evensong at the National Cathedral on Friday, July 1, 2011, at 5:30pm. The National Cathedral is located at one of the highest points in the D.C. area. Construction started on the Cathedral in 1907, and it took most of the 20th century to complete the building. It is influenced strongly by Gothic architecture, and its strong presence is an inspiration to all who have had the opportunity to visit. Many important events have taken place at the National Cathedral including Martin Luther King's final Sunday sermon, the funeral of President Ronald Reagan and the memorial service for 9-11. For the past few months, we were immersed in the music that we planned to sing in this special and sacred space.



September 14 Meeting



Dear Friends,

It is hard for some of us to believe that it. has been ten years since that fateful day of September 11, 2001. However, on the second Sunday in September, the Sunday after Labor

Day, we along with our whole nation will mark this special anniversary that changed the lives of all Americans. As with the death of President Kennedy, we all remember where we were when those jet airplanes crashed into the two twin towers of the World Trade Center.



We, at Saint John's, will observe this day in a very special way. At 9:15am in the Parish Hall, our own Jim Shepherd will speak to our parish on his personal experience of the 9/11 tragedy. Being a part of a military family, Jim lived all over the country and overseas as his father was stationed in different assignments. After working ten years for a heavy equipment excavation

contractor, he and his new bride, Erin, settled in New York City. In the fall of 2000, he became an officer with the New York City Police Department. After completing extensive training, Jim was assigned to the First Precinct of the NYPD, which was responsible for the area of lower Manhattan including the World Trade Center. Of course this meant that Jim was 'front and center' when the tragedy unfolded. Jim's message is one that all of us need to hear, especially our children.

Immediately following his presentation, we will have a Requiem Eucharist at the 10:30am service remembering our own martyrs, Constance and Her Companions, as well as those 'martyrs' who lost their lives on September 11, 2001.

Please make a special effort to join us on this very important day in the life of our nation.

Remembering the Martyrs: Tenth Anniversary of September 11

Sunday, **September 11** at 9:15am in the **Parish Hall**, all adults and teens are invited to a day of remembrance as we hear about experiences and memories of this tragic day in America's history. How do the events of September 11, 2001 continue to affect our lives and our culture a decade later? Our special



speaker will be parishioner Jim Shepherd, who served as a first responder on that fateful day.

Our Family Trees: Oh, the Stories They Tell!



Abraham's family tree is connected by interesting stories. Isaac, Rebekah, Ishmael, Hagar and all the rest of Abraham's family tree may look nothing like ours, but some of the stories are strangely similar because families are awash in stories, especially journey stories. We leave the home place, and

we do it over and over again, then we long to return.

Abraham is known as the patriarch of the Jewish people of today through Isaac, the son born to him and Sarah in their old age in fulfillment of a promise from God. Many Arabic people are also descended from Abraham through his son Ishmael, born to Abraham and his wife's servant, Hagar. How are our lives similar, and what can we learn from Abraham's journeys and the antics of his family line? Join John Sewell on September 18 in the **Upstairs Conference Room** in this entertaining discussion of the members of Abraham's (and our) family tree. Sometimes amusing, sometimes shocking, and always interesting.

Exploring the Parables of Jesus

If you were to consult a modern dictionary for a definition of the word parable, you would probably read that a parable is "a short allegorical story designed to illustrate or teach some truth, religious principle or moral lesson." Although this is clearly an accurate definition, it doesn't

give us a full insight into a biblical parable. To better understand what a parable is, we need to investigate each one in the context of the time and within the tradition of the culture. But what do they mean for us today? Anyone who has read the



first four books of the New Testament will know that one of the most common teaching tools used by Jesus during his ministry was the parable. There are a total of 23 different parables recorded in the books of the Gospel, with 8 of them unique to the Gospel of Saint Matthew, 1 unique to Mark, and 14 unique to Luke. Rather than marking up the trees ourselves, we are offering all items <u>at our cost</u>. There are two advantages to this method: 1 – Prices will be lower and more attractive, thereby inducing you, the consumer, to buy from us. 2 – By offering the items <u>at cost</u>, this allows you to determine the size of donation you make to the EYC <u>and</u> to claim this donation on your 2011 taxes. We still have to discuss the matter among EYC and parents, but we also hope to offer you an option to have your items delivered. 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





"THERE IS A TIME FOR EVERYTHING, AND A SEASON FOR **EVERY ACTIVITY UNDER HEAVEN."** (Ecclesiastes 3:1 NIV)

Solomon tells us that there is a time and a season for everything. Sometimes it's hard for me to remember that - even though everything in nature echoes these words. There is an order, a healthy rhythm to life that reminds us of what we've done and what lies yet to do. There's time for everything he says, so why am I rushing all the time? Where does the time go?

The seasons change in their order, as Creation marches steadfastly from spring through winter.

That's not always the case nowadays - and it's not totally because of our growth! But, like everything else, this church has changed and grown in many

All I know is that we are drawing close to the end of this "season" and that's okay. We hired a church consultant (Rev. Dr. Dick Hamm) a couple of years back to help us make sure we keep moving, keep

heading where God is calling us to go and to make sure we're not "homesteading" right here. You've heard about next steps, new models and of fresh visions for St. Andrew - all things we'd expect to hear in the aftermath of a consultant helping us seek a new vision.

I can't tell you exactly what all this talk means but probably very little in the short run; a staff position will be added, some programming will probably be altered or added to, conversations are taking place about how can we do this or that better or more effectively and these will no doubt lead to changes at the appropriate times - all things in their season, right?



I believe we are firmly in the middle of a growing season here at St. Andrew, and, depending on what you're growing, there will undoubtedly be pruning back or adding-to that lies ahead. One thing we have to make sure we do is to exhibit a holy patience and not get ahead of ourselves. That is, we need to move as quickly as God calls us to move, but no quicker. To do otherwise is to risk getting ahead of our season, and

thereby running ahead of God. Bad idea. We're just not that smart or that long-seeing.

I guess what I'm trying to say, and maybe not saying it so well,

is that we are
not what we were
and not what
we're meant to
be - but, we'll
get there. I have
Confidence in
God's plans and
the leadership

of this church. We'll get there. I am so grateful to the "old" leaders who have brought us to where we are right now. We owe much to them for getting us over the challenges and hurdles of yesterday. And, I am excited for the future leaders that God is preparing to stand ready, in their time, and, with God's help, to tackle the challenges of tomorrow.

However, until tomorrow comes, there is today to be enjoyed and grateful for. As important as yesterday was and tomorrow will be, let's not give away a single second of THIS day - there's just too much to do now to waste today (and I know you WON'T) wondering about what comes next. With God's help, we'll get there. May God bless you and yours!

Remembering

... is our featured ministry this month! Losing anything of significance - a job, a home, a relationship, function - can cause grief. The loss, though, of someone to whom you are deeply connected is usually the most grievous. Many of us have heard of the stages of grief made well known by the late Elizabeth Kübler-Ross. She argued that bereaved people typically pass though five unique stages: denial, anger, bargaining, depression, and acceptance. More recent research shows that grief does not come in stages and that it is not the same for everyone (Bonanno, George A. The Other Side of Sadness. 2009.) In fact, this research shows that there is tremendous variability in how people react to loss and that it is better understood in patterns, citing three of the most common or characteristic patterns of grief-reaction: prolonged, recovery and resilient.



InTouch recognizes that the loss experienced by the death of those we deeply love affects us all, that it is a very personal and singular journey, and that it IS different for everyone; that time is not always relevant, nor is the connection (e.g., the death of a lifelong friend can hurt as much or more as that of a family member). We especially

Our Remembering ministry does its best to take all of these factors into account and reaches out to those who are suffering deep loss with expressions of remembrances at various times following the loss. LuAnn Bogess and Linda Leverenz were the first coordinators for this powerful ministry. Linda has recently transitioned to other roles within the Church and Pam Robertson has stepped up and claimed this ministry as hers! A sincere thank you goes to Linda for her devotion to this ministry and help in its start -up and to LuAnn for her continued passion and devotion to it. And, of course, a big welcome to Pam. These women truly live the guiding text of this ministry: "Rejoice with those who rejoice; mourn with those who mourn."

Apple/Day KEEPS Dr. Away!

"Hate what is evil; Cling to what is good."

Romans 12:9b

CLING ON!

Hate what is evil; cling to what is good. Sounds like pretty wise advice, even if a little obvious. Paul gave this instruction to the Church in Rome as one of many ways that believers would exemplify the love of Christ. Hate is a strong word. And cling is an unusual one. It conjures a particular intensity of holding on. It makes us think of being intertwined, adhering and resisting separation. We cling to the past. We cling to loved ones. We cling for dear life. Clinging to what is good with just such an intensity begs the question, "what is good?" To what specifically should we cling?



In another text Jesus tells us that "No one is good - except God alone." (Luke 18:19). If the only thing that is good is God and we, as Christ-followers, are to cling to what is good, then Paul's instruction means to cling to Jesus; to hold on to Him for dear life; to resist separating from Him. So, how do we do that? One idea is to use this concept as a framework for making decisions, as a check and balance on our actions. For example, we could ask:

- Would adding this activity (committee, sport, event) bring more stress to our family, sending us further away from Jesus, or would it bring us closer?
- Would going to lunch with my co-workers who gossip about others and talk negatively separate me from Jesus or bring me closer?
- Does hanging out with this boy or this girl help move me closer to Jesus or will it take me away?

For Christ-followers, clinging to Him is irresistible. So if that describes you - a Christ-follower who desires to cling to Jesus for dear life - then join me and Cling On!

On July 24 at 7:15 in the morning, forty-four hearty Sr high youth and adult leaders headed out for our week long mission trip. We were supposed to have forty-five but Matt Klenosky had a high fever and had to miss it. So on Sunday we headed to Six Flags to get some R&R before Monday rolled around. After Six Flags, we headed to our hotel and had a fun evening hanging out and getting to know everyone. We woke up Monday morning, had a great complimentary breakfast and then packed up and had a morning devotional in the poolside patio/garden. Tom, our youth group leader, challenged all of us to follow Luke 12:48 "When someone has been given much, much will be required in return; and when someone has been entrusted with much, even more will be required." He reminded all of us that we all have been given a lot both from our church but also from our parents and community. Tom also hit us up with some Eminem and quoted from the song Lose Yourself.

"Look, if you had one shot, or one opportunity To seize everything you ever wanted - one moment Would you capture it? Or just let it slip? Yo"

He reminded us that we would have lots of opportunities to better ourselves during the week and it would be up to us to capture it.

"You better lose yourself in the music, the moment You own it, you better never let it go You only get one shot, do not miss your chance to blow This opportunity comes once in a lifetime. Yo"

He also reminded us that we would have chances during worship or other parts of the week to really get into the experience and not to be afraid or to worry about what others think. He reminded us to be true to thine own-self.





Lastly, Tom talked about doing God's purpose over our own preferences. He ended it by handing out the blue rubber bracelets that Tim had handed out a few weeks earlier. He challenged all of us to wear them and to take an extra one and to hand it out to someone during the week; to give it to someone who inspired us or who could use a pick-me-up or to someone who just needed to be reminded of the saying on the bracelet.

After all that, we headed to Wheaton College, checked into our dorm rooms and checked out the campus. That evening we had our first Bible study and 15 youth showed up even though it was optional. Later that evening we had corporate worship and got to meet Jeremy Kingsley, our camp pastor, and Unhindered, our worship leader for the week. Worship was awesome and I was positive that the week was going to be Awesome. After worship our entire group met for group time and Maclaine Leaird led us in a devotional. All week other youth led us in devotionals, including Laney Arrowsmith, Ian Leaird and Karissa Weston. All during the week

at group time we talked about Jesus moments - moments when we saw Jesus during the day. Or we talked about someone in the group who impressed or inspired us. This was one of my favorite parts of the day because it was about us and how we were interacting with God and with each other.



We worked on the mission part of our trip for Senior Home Sharing, a 501c3 organization that saw a need for affordable senior living and now has five group homes around Chicago. We broke into five teams of eight or so workers and covered all the homes. We painted inside and out; we stained two decks; we weeded like crazy; we spread over 150 bags of mulch; we cleaned gutters (filled with disgusting things) and pruned trees and moved furniture and cleaned and

organized garages, basements, etc...Senior Home Sharing was blown away at how hard our teams worked. They had had other teams volunteer before but had never seen so many youth work so hard the entire time that they worked. Senior Sharing was so happy with our work that they grilled lunch for us on Thursday and also had an ice cream social for us. As much as they loved us, our group was the real winner. We were able to serve others as Jesus has taught us and we were able to grow closer together as a group at the same time.



It is hard to really explain why I love the mission trip to someone who has never gone before. While the mission work is rewarding and growing closer to each other is awesome also, the one thing that we all love is the time to worship. It is hard to explain how 650 youth from all over America (we met kids from Pennsylvania, Missouri, Nebraska, Louisiana, Arkansas, Maryland, Alabama, Florida, Illinois and so many more) can pack a sanctuary and be absolutely quiet when the pastor is speaking. He was talking to us about topics that matter to us in language that

we understand and get. The band would play and you had 650 youth swaying and jumping together and praising God as only youth can. We had the place actually shaking, the large speakers and TV monitors were moving because we were jumping and moving with the spirit. Every morning and night we had worship and we had youth get there 30 minutes early to save us seats up front.

I believe we all came back more devoted to Jesus than we were before we went. On Tuesday night they had a chance for us to make an altar call to let Jesus know that we wanted to be

real Christians, more than just believers but followers of Jesus. We had youth who gave themselves over to Jesus. It was really emotional for us but the leaders helped us get through it then and later on also. I can not thank everyone who helped us go on this trip but I want to thank our entire church and community. I hope you will see a different Senior High group than the one who left. We are more thankful for what we have and for each other. We will

continue to give back to our church and we hope all of you will come to our Recap/Review meeting on August 28 at 6 p.m. to hear more about our experience.



Blessing Our Pets - A Tradition That Honors St. Francis



Blessing animals, and especially pets, has become a traditional part of the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of animals and ecology. On Sunday, October 2, you can bring your own pet to St. James Episcopal Church for a blessing from Amma Diane, as part of 10:00AM worship. Some of our very best friends may be animals — so this is another chance to "bring a friend to church." Last year dogs of all sizes and shapes, as well as a few stuffed animals, received a blessing.

Pets who come to church should

be properly restrained, and there will be helpers in the sanctuary to make sure the experience runs smoothly. Please bring your friend in a manner that allows you to control potential harmful behavior. Bring leashes, toys, treats, bowls, or even a kennel — whatever you would use when you take your pet out in public. Your pet may need a place to stay before and after the blessing unless the



animal can stay calmly with you for the service. You may prefer to bring a photo of your pet, or a special stuffed animal friend, for a blessing on October 2.



St. Francis was a lover of animals and is often pictured surrounded by birds and beasts. It is said that he preached to the birds, tamed wild wolves, and allowed the beasts of the forest to rest in his arms. The animals seemed to sense his unconditional love for all living creatures. His traditional feast day is October 4. The following prayer, attributed to St Francis, is found on page 833 of *The Book of Common Prayer:*

"Lord, make us instruments of your peace. Where there is hatred, let us

sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is discord, union; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy. Grant that we may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. Amen."

The chapel at St. James is also used for 12:15PM worship every Wednesday, and for Morning Prayer worship every Friday at 6:30AM. It is a space for quiet contemplation and prayer, for intimate worship and meetings, and for our columbarium (a place for cremated remains.)

Raising Awareness and Contributions for the African Well Fund



The African Well Fund will be a beneficiary of our Pasta Supper fund raiser on Thursday, October 27. St. James Church Episcopal member Joanna Sanchez was a founding board member o f this organization which is dedicated to raising funds for building and maintaining wells in Africa. The organization began in 2002 when a group of U2 fans, inspired by the singer

Bono, learned of the relatively low cost to build a well for an African village, and the enormous difference that a well can make in the lives of the villagers.

Since 2002 the group has raised almost \$1 million, with 242 total projects, and 289,445 people served. One hundred

percent of all funds raised by the African Well Fund go to providing water to people, because the group uses 100% volunteer effort. The projects they fund are sustainable because they include planning for sanitation and maintenance training.

Crafting Group Adds Beadwork to Ministry

- green seedless grapes 2 pounds

Topping: brown sugar ½ cup and praline pecans

De-stem, wash and dry grapes. Mix cream cheese, sour cream and sugar. Add grapes, mix and chill. Sprinkle topping just before serving.

Hearing Loop Installed - Try It Out!

The St. James sanctuary now has a "hearing loop" which enables people with hearing loss to wear a headset in order to better readings, sermons, announcements that delivered v i a our microphone system. Members can also use their own hearing aides as a "minireceiver" if they have a telecoil setting.



HEARING LOOP INSTALLED Switch hearing aid to T-coil

How does it work? A wire cable loop was installed under the floor of the sanctuary in mid-September. The loop creates a magnetic field that delivers the amplified signal directly from the microphone to the hearing aide or receiver. It's like a miniature radio station delivering sound directly to your ear.

The Hearing Loop can feed audio directly to hearing aids equipped with a T-coil (telecoil)—about 70% of aids have a Tcoil. If you can set your hearing aid to a T or MT (mic/T-coil) setting, audio from our sound system will be received directly by your device. If your hearing aid does not have a T-coil option, or you do not wear a hearing aid, there are a few portable headsets available in the back of the church—we can order more headsets if needed.



Vatican II is Topic of October 11 Forum

On January 25, 1959, the newly elected Pope, Angelo Guiseppe Roncalli, better known as Pope John XXIII, announced his desire to form a new council to promote, "the enlightenment, edification, and joy of the entire Christian people". During this time of history, the West was in Post-World War II mode along with being in the heat of the cold war. As a surprise visionary, Pope John XXIII was one of those men who knew that the world was only going to change more rapidly, and that the Roman Catholic Church needed to catch up or be forever left behind. A new age was dawning that needed new solutions and approaches.

Join us for the Zimmer Forum at Silver Lake College on Tuesday, October 11 at 12:15PM, to learn more about the document that changed the Roman Catholic religion. Fr. Bill Swichtenberg, Pastor at St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church (Algoma) & Holy Rosary Roman Catholic Church (Kewaunee) will present Fr. John W. O'Malley's book, *What Happened at Vatican II*. O'Malley's book captures the story of the spirit in which decisions were made that changed the way all Christians live and worship.

In 1995, the Interfaith Academy of Parish Clergy named Fr. Zimmer its National Pastor of the Year. Carrying on his name, his sister Mary began a monthly collaboration of intellectual speakers to continue his lifelong pursuit of educating people from all cultures. Her brother loved reading, so asking presenters to focus on books that helped shape their minds and hearts on their personal faith journeys was fitting. Fr. Zimmer had also served as an adjunct professor at Silver Lake College.

Diocesan Convention to Vote on Creating a New Diocese

The 137th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Fond du Lac takes place in Fond du Lac on Friday and Saturday, October 21 -22, 2011. Voting delegates from St. James Episcopal Church are the Rev. Diane Murray, Tauno "Joe" Mike, Anne Schuette, and Diane Wilson.

These delegates will be part of an historic vote to decide if our diocese and the Diocese of Eau Claire should join together to create a brand new diocese that would cover the northern portion of Wisconsin. The Diocese of Eau Claire will also be in special convention on the same day, and will vote on the same question at exactly the same time. A major

the same question at exactly the same time. A majority of both lay and clergy delegates in both dioceses must approve the merger in order for the new diocese to be created. If the vote is in favor of joining together, the rest of the process in which the new diocese comes into being will take about 15 months.

Your delegates to this convention would be happy to receive input from St. James members about this vote. They have had an opportunity to attend diocesan informational meetings and read several reports pertaining to this vote. A Fellowship Day for both of the dioceses on September 24 in Wausau gave

delegates and others a chance to meet each other and share experiences.

To find out more, visit the Diocese of Fond du Lac web site http://www.diofdl.org, and read the "Joint Task Force

Report" which is the final summary of months of discussion by representatives from both dioceses about this proposal. You will find information about the elements of a new diocese, the legalities, logistics, process, and a brief time line. The report also includes the question and answer bulletin inserts that each diocese has used this summer.

Please keep all the delegates from both dioceses in your prayers during the month of October.

The Spirit "Rewind"

On occasion we'll feature an article that was published in a previous edition of *The Spirit*. This month we're including a piece written by Tony Karl, the Music Director at St. James Episcopal Church. This article was previously published in April 2011.

The Diversity of Us, The Diversity of Our Music/Worship

The next time you are worshipping at St. James Episcopal Church, look around you. Don't just take a quick glance, but really look at the people God has joined together as sisters and brothers in our faith community. God has blessed us to be a remarkably diverse group—and that goes far beyond the more obvious gender and ethnic diversity that many might first notice when they think about diversity.

We have a remarkable diversity in ages—from those who have been alive for only months, to those who have been alive for nearly a century, and every age group in between. We have a range of household types—couples with and without children, singles with and without children, widowed, separated, divorced one or more times, relatives, friends, dating, engaged, married 50 years. We are diverse in sexual orientation with lesbian and gay singles, couples, and families sitting side-by-side with the straight singles, couples, and families of our faith community. We commune with people who support a wide range of political beliefs and ideals. We worship with some who enjoy financial stability, some who live paycheck-topaycheck, some who struggle with unemployment and underemployment, some managing a household, some who feel the pressure of running a business, some unable to work, and some who worry about their current or future retirement.

We come from a variety of faith backgrounds--some have been Episcopalian their entire life, some come from Roman or Byzantine Catholic background, some from other mainline Protestant backgrounds, some come from Evangelical backgrounds, and some encountered God for the first time at St. James. Some grew up in a church, some left church and returned later in life, some first came to church as adults, some are "newborn" Christians, others have spent years growing in their relationship with God. We grow in faith among people with a wide range of health—some with temporary illness or injury, some with long-term disease or disability, some living with chronic pain or mental health issues, some who are healing or recently recovered.

Some of us are lifelong Manitowoc residents, some have come from other cities or states. Some of us have been convicted of crimes, some have been wrongfully accused, some have never even had a speeding ticket. Some of us have travelled the world, some have never been outside Wisconsin. Some are college-educated, some are still in school, and some were never able to finish their education. Some have served our country in times of war or in times of peace, some have never been in the military, and some are pacifists. We have an amazing variety of skills and interests—crafts, sports, praying, cooking, travelling, learning, playing with toys, working, hunting, teaching, reading, music, going to school, theater, gardening, art, camping, relaxing... the list goes on and on. And we are so very lucky to enjoy such diversity in all these areas—we celebrate a breadth of humankind that most organizations, clubs, and groups do not have.

"Embracing Diversity" is one of the core values of our church, and is also expressed in our mission. Along with this diversity, our reasons for initially coming to St. James are different—and so are our reasons for coming on any given day. And the diversity of our own emotions means that how we encounter God and each other can vary from time to time. This also affects how we worship God, including how music impacts our worship.

In the music we use in worship, we try to reflect the diversity of our congregation and our past and current experiences. And we're always striving to do this more effectively. I always appreciate the constructive feedback that many of you share with me about our music and worship at St. James. In the coming months, I'll be doing some more intentional feedback gathering, to see what we are doing well and what we can improve.

Through the remainder of Lent, Holy Week, and Easter, I encourage each and every one of you to intentionally think about these things. Reflect on how music/worship impacts you as a unique child of God, in the diversity of your own changing emotions and experiences. And reflect on how you see music/worship impacting the diverse sisters and brothers whom God surrounds you with when you are at St. James.



Spirital Growth & Maturity

Pentecost is that long green season that stretches from Easter to Advent. In Iowa each spring we witness the earth's transformation from brown to green as the corn and soybeans sprout, grow and mature into a crop that feeds much of the world. In a sense, that is what God calls forth and wishes for God's people, that we would sprout, grow and mature into a harvest of faith hope and love that feeds the world.

This summer I had the opportunity to attend a month long training with Christian Peacemaker Teams in Chicago. The training was challenging and rigorous, just the way I had hoped it would be. As farmers know, sometimes strenuous


conditions are good for crops as roots are forced deeper into the soil to seek the nutrients needed for robust growth and production. In the same way rigorous and challenging study and training in the ways of Christ force our roots to go deeper into the soil of Jesus and when this happens, our yields increase.

There are many ways to enter into a rigorous study of God's word. First, open the Bible and pick a book to focus on. Second, look for a good commentary on that book from Amazon or Augsburg Fortress (ask your pastor for advise). Then dig in daily and rigorously. If that doesn't work, join a class or start a small group with others who also want to grow. It may be that your Biblical literacy is just fine but

what you need is a greater understanding of the sacraments. If that is the case purchase a large or small catechism and dig in. Perhaps it's social justice that has you intrigued. There are several great books I could steer you towards in that area.

Pastor Greg and I are currently looking at the fall calendar to see what classes we might offer. If you have a desire to study or grow in a certain area please, don't be shy, let us know so we can respond in ways that are helpful to you in your faith life

Communion and Worship

During mealtimes and in between plenary sessions, I regularly asked voting members to name a highlight of their week. The first two dozen or so answered with the same word: "worship." When I finally got a new answer
— "moments shared with others
during the in-between times" —
I realized how attuned we are to
communion. We love to share.

What we have shared in worship this week has been extraordinary. We journeyed from Christ's birth to his death, and a resurrected life that freed us. We shared celebratory, music-filled moments that led us into thought-filled declarations of the word. More than a thousand voices raised each day to praise the God who calls us into common mission. We have been freed to serve.

Every time we sang, I remembered my days singing in the Wartburg College Choir. As back then, our worship space

this week filled with voices singing boldly, joyfully, melodically and harmoniously. The energy was electric. Traditional hymns and chanted responses framed other worship-filled moments that had a more ethnic flavor. We often sang hymns and heard Scripture read in languages other than English. Saying that the services had something for everyone mutes the depth and texture of what happened in our worship every day. Our times of communion were opportunities to celebrate the diversity of the ELCA. Our worship carried us seamlessly through a celebration of the unity that is present in our wonderful diversity.

One of the Augsburg Fortress displays invited people

to affix sticky notes that listed something they would like to change about their congregation's worship. As the parent of a child with multiple disabilities, I especially appreciated a plea posted to make worship more welcoming and accessible to all. But the word used most often on the notes for the wall was "more," as in more music, more silence, more hugging, more steel guitar, more organ (well, there was one note with a desire for less organ), more meditation, more energy, more children, more focus on God and, yes, even more cow bell.

Clearly, when it comes to worship, we want — perhaps even need — more.

Why Do We "Share the Peace?" Because Jesus Commanded We Do!

In John 14, Jesus tells his disciples: "Peace I leave with you. My peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives." The sharing of the peace in worship is an enactment of this sharing of Christ's peace, the sure and certain hope of the righteousness secured for us by Christ's death on the cross.

Because Christ's peace is one of forgiveness of sins, sharing the peace is far more than a simple "Hello," or a handshake. Because Christ has forgiven us, we are called to forgive others, and sharing the peace is about doing just that. To say "Peace be with you," is to proclaim Christ's forgiveness of that person's sins; in worship, we hear this procla-

mation first from the minister to the congregation, and then we are invited to share that proclamation with one another. It is an acknowledgement that we are all one in Christ, all forgiven by Christ. To share the peace is to break down barriers that divide us and to be reconciled to each other regardless of personal relationships. For this reason, sharing the peace is one of the most important elements of worship—it is living out in worship what God has done in Christ.

Why do we do it before the offering? In Matthew, Jesus admonishes us, "So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there

before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift." This is why we typically place the Sharing of the Peace immediately after the prayers and before the offering. We sometimes place it after the Lord's Prayer as a way to live out what we have just prayed. And at the end of worship, we hear Christ's word of peace again: "Go in peace. Serve the Lord." Christ's peace is invoked as we are sent out to share that peace with a broken world.

When our pastors invite you to greet one another at the beginning of worship, it is an invitation to say "Hello," to those around you and welcome them to worship. When our pastors invite you to share the peace, however, it is an invitation to live out Christ's forgiveness and to be reconciled to your brothers and sisters in Christ by proclaiming Christ's peace to them. As you share the peace in worship, remind yourself of the importance and significance of that act, and perhaps the way you share it may be renewed: close friends may share their peace with a hug, finding a simple handshake inadequate; spouses may share a kiss of peace, a witness to Christ's abiding love and peace in their marriage.

However you share it, share it fully! Forgive and love one another as Christ has forgiven and loved you.

Board Reports for August

Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees is happy to report that year-to-date revenues vs. expenditures ending in July show a positive balance of \$16,474. The board is thankful and humbled by the generosity of Immanuel's members.

The property report discussed the Hanson Family Life Center's service agreement with Immanuel and it was determined to look at the agreement more closely to come up with better defined roles for both Immanuel and HFLC.

The Personnel report approved the Children's Education Coordinator's, Melanie Leber, contract for the upcoming year. 

From the Pastor

Many of you have asked about the World Methodist Council and Conference I attended in Durban, South Africa. It is always hard to express briefly all the work and experiences one has at such a large event. For it is even more difficult to because of my involvement with the ongoing work and ministry of the council, however I will do my best to be brief and informative.

The first three days of my time were doing the work on of the Council. The last five years we have been working on restructuring the organization and completely overhauling the constitution and bylaws. This work is never easy for any organization and even more so for an international organization. It was a blessing to see the work we had put in paid off and we were able to receive the full council's approval after three days of finishing touches and debate. This new structure allows more involvement of member churches in the five year cycle. It also restructures some of the leadership to be more focused in regions of the globe. We always are reviewing the work of the committees and their structures as well.

As the chair of Formal Education, a subcommittee of the Education Committee, I had the opportunity to present the work we have accomplished over the last five years at both the council meeting and the conference. One of the big announcements we had was that by our suggestion the universities and colleges in the Methodist and Wesley Traditions have agreed to accept transfer of credits. This move will make possible students fulfilling required internship credits for graduation in other countries. For example a student attending a Methodist College in

the USA will be able to take credit at a Methodist College in Chile and teach in one of their Methodist Primary or Secondary schools and receive credit for it. This means some of our Primary and Secondary schools in other countries can have student teachers lowering their financial burden but still have top quality teachers in the classroom.

The World Methodist Conference was the next four days and is open to anyone. The Conference has wonderful worship reflecting the diversity of Methodist and Wesleyan experiences from around the world. Our focus tends to be on the host nation, but we always are reminded of all our expressions in worship. The Lord's Prayer in our Native Languages is always a joy as several thousand join together. There is time to worship in local congregations and this year we even held a march throughout the city, shutting down many streets as we made our way to the capital building for a celebration. There are many work shops and keynote speakers offering training and new perspectives on what our brother and sister churches are doing throughout the world.

Other highlights included being asked to deliver the backpacks to several of the schools, including a couple in the informal settlements (slums). We also heard a report on the continued work with the Catholic Church, the Lutheran Church and the Salvation Army. We are also actively working on beginning conversations with the Orthodox Churches; all important conversations as the One Body of Christ in this world.

Thank you for your prayers and on behalf of the schools in South Africa thank you for the book bags.



From the Pastor

Many of you have asked about the World Methodist Council and Conference I attended in Durban, South Africa. It is always hard to express briefly all the work and experiences one has at such a large event. For it is even more difficult to because of my involvement with the ongoing work and ministry of the council, however I will do my best to be brief and informative.

The first three days of my time were doing the work on of the Council. The last five years we have been working on restructuring the organization and completely overhauling the constitution and bylaws. This work is never easy for any organization and even more so for an international organization. It was a blessing to see the work we had put in paid off and we were able to receive the full council's approval after three days of finishing touches and debate. This new structure allows more involvement of member churches in the five year cycle. It also restructures some of the leadership to be more focused in regions of the globe. We always are reviewing the work of the committees and their structures as well.

As the chair of Formal Education, a subcommittee of the Education Committee, I had the opportunity to present the work we have accomplished over the last five years at both the council meeting and the conference. One of the big announcements we had was that by our suggestion the universities and colleges in the Methodist and Wesley Traditions have agreed to accept transfer of credits. This move will make possible students fulfilling required internship credits for graduation in other countries. For example a student attending a Methodist College in

the USA will be able to take credit at a Methodist College in Chile and teach in one of their Methodist Primary or Secondary schools and receive credit for it. This means some of our Primary and Secondary schools in other countries can have student teachers lowering their financial burden but still have top quality teachers in the classroom.

The World Methodist Conference was the next four days and is open to anyone. The Conference has wonderful worship reflecting the diversity of Methodist and Wesleyan experiences from around the world. Our focus tends to be on the host nation, but we always are reminded of all our expressions in worship. The Lord's Prayer in our Native Languages is always a joy as several thousand join together. There is time to worship in local congregations and this year we even held a march throughout the city, shutting down many streets as we made our way to the capital building for a celebration. There are many work shops and keynote speakers offering training and new perspectives on what our brother and sister churches are doing throughout the world.

Other highlights included being asked to deliver the backpacks to several of the schools, including a couple in the informal settlements (slums). We also heard a report on the continued work with the Catholic Church, the Lutheran Church and the Salvation Army. We are also actively working on beginning conversations with the Orthodox Churches; all important conversations as the One Body of Christ in this world.

Thank you for your prayers and on behalf of the schools in South Africa thank you for the book bags.





From the Bishop

I've been saying these are days for bold, creative, Spirit-led ministries if we are to reach out with the Gospel to an increasingly secularized world. But what do such ministries of outreach look like?

In July Anita and I were in Seattle on vacation and visited Bishop Chris and Dee Dee Boerger. We were their guests at Luther's Table (www.lutherstable.org), one of the 16 (!) new ministries of the Northwest Washington Synod. Bishop Boerger speaks of Northwest Washington as a missionary synod, living as they do in the "Land of None." None is what the vast majority of people list as their religious preference in the census, the lure of the Cascades, the Olympics, Puget Sound, the San Juan Islands having captured their heart. So how do you grow the Church and give a credible witness to the faith?

Luther's Table is a new ministry in Renton, Washington, one that incorporates casual dining, community connections, and theological dialogue. Think of Martin Luther inviting students to his and Katie's home for dinner, a beer and theological conversation, and you have an idea of the concept in this outreach ministry.

In 2006 Renton Lutheran Church, a congregation with Icelandic heritage, closed after 50 plus years of ministry. That might have been the end of the story except for the passion, commitment and leadership of area pastors and lay leaders, including some from Renton Lutheran. The generating idea took root, financing was found, the old church building came down, and after several years of labor what has emerged is a neighborhood diner and apartments where the church building once stood. The diner is up front about its intent. It is Luther's Table, a place for connecting people in meaningful ways and helping them find community. They do this while serving hearty meals, with beer and wine, in moderation and humility, of course!

I had Luther's Plate for dinner (sausage, potato salad, and a beer). But one could also order The Vicar, the Sinner, the Katy Luther, or the Pope, the latter a sandwich of prosciutto with orange fig relish, caramelized onions, goat cheese and greens. Local pastors and lay leaders volunteer time as bar tenders and table servers as well as vocalists and musicians on the stage. Young men from the community were given time on the stage to share their musical talents while we were there.

Luther's Plate is a nontipping establishment, but guests may leave donations that benefit community organizations. A local woman's shelter was the recipient the evening we were there.

Pastor Gretchen Mertes is the pastor and mission developer of Luther's table. There is a worshipping community, a new congregation being developed in this place of the old church. The diner is closed on Mondays, but the building is open for Word and Sacrament worship when the congregation gathers.

Gretchen, who served as vicar with the St. Louis Campus Ministry about a dozen years ago, points to the many ways the Lutheran heritage and the congregational life finds itself in this ministry. There is the stained glass window with Jesus holding up two fingers in blessing behind the bar. Or, she says with a smile, is he ordering drinks for this gathering of tax collectors and sinners? There is the seating made from the pews of the congregation. There is the password, *sola fide* (faith alone), for use of the free internet. Now that's a conversation started!

Luther's Place opened in March of 2011 and the fruits of this missionary endeavor are yet to be fully realized. But I was impressed with the concept, the community connection, and the life of the people I saw in the café booths. I wonder what bold, creative, daring ministries the Spirit might lead us in the Central States Synod to imagine for the sake of outreach with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Luther's Place "fits" in Renton, Washington. What would help the Church connect in our urban and suburban neighborhoods or rural communities. The *land of None* may be more pronounced in the Pacific Northwest, but it is alive and well in the Midwest. Are we ready to be led by the Spirit of Pentecost and sent as a missionary synod?





Restored to Her Divine Vocation

I recently had a wonderful conversation with a member of Immanuel who came to me with concerns, feeling that I personally and perhaps others at Immanuel haven't or do not support our military men and women in their efforts on behalf of the nation. He had rightly heard me criticize the size of our nation's defense/war budget suggesting that we spend a lot of bread money on military efforts instead of caring for the poor. He hadn't heard prayers for our men and women in uniform during the prayers of intercession; again he was accurate. Neither had he heard anything other than silence on veteran's issues and the often less than adequate treatment they receive.

I was grateful to have the opportunity to talk with this person, who himself has proudly worn the uniform, in order that we could discuss the issues and be in dialogue about these sorts of things. It gave us a chance to listen, respond to, and understand each other. As we conversed I realized we shared many of the same concerns but had a different approach to them. In the end we understood and respected one another. He thanked me and I made a commitment to encourage our assisting ministers to be more intentional about praying for the healing of our nation, for our service men and women as well as for our enemies as Iesus commands us to do.


I share this story with you as a way to explore with you an insight from theologian Walter Wink's book The Powers That Be. Wink suggests that everything in God's creation, whether

humans, governments, education systems, the family, the church, is good and therefore has a divine vocation to serve the greater good. Wink states, "Every aspect of creation is good; it is also fallen, and therefore stands at risk of forfeiting its divine vocation exchanging its divine vacation for a false vocation of serving self." Good, yes! Fallen, yes! Yet, because it was created by God every aspect of creation has the potential to be redeemed and restored to its divine vocation - even though imperfectly this side of heaven. Wink writes, "When a particular power becomes idolatrous - that is, when it pursues a vocation other than the one for which God created it and makes its own interests the highest good then that power becomes demonic. The spiritual task is to unmask this idolatry and recall the powers to their created purpose in the world."

This was the unspoken objective of the conversation mentioned above. We both believe that the United States has a divine calling to serve the greater good; we also believe that the United States has lost sight of that divine calling to one degree or another and it's our task as citizens and as Christians to call her back into her divine vocation. We can't do that without being in dialogue with each other and with God. Critique and criticism does not mean contempt for that which is being critiqued, in fact, it could be the opposite. To say nothing when something is wrong is to let that which has lost its divine calling fall into the abyss of darkness. We critique because we love.

I was taught by an aging

parishioner who liked to talk politics and religion that, 'My country, right or wrong,' isn't he whole saying. "That's not the whole statement," he said to me one day. "The whole statement is, 'My country, right or wrong; when wrong, righted!" This gave us a chance to dialogue about what is good about the United States and what needs righted. We critique to unmask and recall the powers we love to their divine vocation.

This July citizens of the United States will again celebrate Independence Day. It is a day we treasure as a nation, commemorating the adoption of the Declaration of Independence

on July 4, 1776 declaring independence from the Kingdom of Great Britain. As citizens of the United States we have freedom and opportunity unmatched in most of the world. Many risk life and limb to come to the United States hoping to acquire the freedoms and privilege that we were born into and that are protected by the sacrifice of those in uniform. If we truly love her then let's not be afraid to be in dialogue with each other, with our representatives and others about what is wrong and what needs fixing in order for her to reclaim her divine calling of "Liberty and justice for all."

ergy. The Creator did not just create the world billions of years ago; He is still creating here and now! He creates life and energy in our tired human hearts. What is God doing new in you? I believe God is calling us to embark on a new adventure!



Choosing Music for Worship

In our Lutheran understanding of music, we believe that music is a gift of God for the purpose of building up the church and glorifying God. Music functions as both proclamation and prayer—it helps communicate the Word of God (proclamation) and it gives us, as worshipers, a way to respond to that Word (prayer). Because of this close connection in Lutheran worship between music and the Word of God, we go to great lengths to ensure that both the text and tune of the songs we sing are fitting and appropriate for worship. What does that mean?

First, it means that we pick songs with texts that reinforce Lutheran theology. For example, we believe that faith comes by the Holy Spirit, not by our own personal choice; therefore we would avoid planning "I Have Decided to Follow Jesus" in Lutheran worship.

Second, it means selecting music in which the tunes fit the text. Imagine singing the text of "Joy to the World" to the tune of "Amazing Grace." Not very joyful, is it? The melody should support the affect of the text.

Third, it means choosing music that is singable by the congregation, since congregations generally do not practice the music ahead of time. The music should be simple, but not simplistic, so that it is accessible and learnable by rote but not so much so that it is trivial or pedantic.

Fourth, the music should be durable—that is, able to withstand the wear and tear of being sung over years and decades and generations. Otherwise, if all our worship music were merely disposable songs crafted for this moment in time, what would connect us to those Christians who have gone before us, and what music would we write today that we could leave for future generations to sing?

Fifth, the music should relate to the theme of the day, the liturgical moment, or both. By that I mean that the music should function primarily to further unpack the lessons and sermon for the day, but it may also serve to facilitate the flow of worship. In other words, the gathering music serves to gather us together and the sending music serves to send us out.

There are still other considerations to be made when selecting music for worship, but these are five of the most important. This doesn't mean, of course, that we don't make exceptions. Sometimes the song is right for worship, even if it doesn't pass all the "tests." But know that, behind the scenes, pastors and musicians are wrestling with these questions in order to plan the best possible music for worship on Sunday morning, and we invite you to let us know how well we're doing!

Sound Techs Wanted! We are in desperate need of individuals willing to learn how to run the sound system, an important role that is not nearly as complicated as it looks. There Goes the Bride ...

It was called the most spectacular wedding of the century, watched on TV by 1,000,000 people - England's William and Kate - married in a beautiful, historic cathedral. The bride and groom properly waved to the crowd; a queen was in attendance; truly, a royal wedding! Months of preparation; hundreds of planners, rehearsals, endless lists, protocol and stress preceded the event.

BUT - to the Immanuel Family the most beautiful brides and handsome grooms are married under the cross over the altar in our sanctuary. Relatives and friends are in attendance to witness the blessing of God on these special couples and hear their commitment to each other. Royalty? More so to us at Immanuel than "that other wedding!"

How do Immanuel weddings happen - without stress? This is all done, behind the scenes, by Immanuel wedding hostesses. They won't be seated in the front row, their name is not listed in the wedding bulletin, they aren't announced at the wedding and you don't see them on the Messenger calendar.

Originally a part of WELCA, wedding hostess service group helped brides plan a wedding and reception at Immanuel. Now, receptions are part of WELCA; they plan receptions for anniversaries, birthdays, confirmations, ordinations, baptisms and graduations. Wedding hostess group is part of the church; they plan weddings.

Hostesses meet at the first of the year to assign the year's wedding schedule, one hostess per wedding. Bride and hostess meet first about two months before and again a few weeks before the wedding. The hostess supports the bride and suggests and helps okay items she might need for all parts of the wedding (flowers, candles, lighting, sound, music, pictures, number of guests). She explains Immanuel regulations for weddings, assists the pastor with the plans and keeps him informed of the bride's wishes. The church office handles Immanuel wedding fees.

To the outsider, the first obvious help to the bride is the rehearsal. Procession, timing, order of service, location of bridal party, seating protocol of family and guests, are directed by the hostess and she corrects any problems.

On wedding day, from the narthex, the hostess directs all that was rehearsed, sending each person in the party down the aisle. After the wedding, the hostess stores Immanuel items and makes sure the church is ready for services.

I talked to mothers of two recent Immanuel brides. They praised the hostesses for efficient weddings which were stress-and-troublefree. The mothers said that after meeting with the hostesses they didn't worry about the events and then, on the day, they could relax and enjoy their daughters' weddings.

"THERE GOES THE BRIDE," the hostesses says as she sends the bride, last of the wedding party, down the aisle in yet another beautiful, stress-free Immanuel wedding.

2011 Western Iowa Synod Assembly Report

The Assembly of the Western Iowa Synod was held June 3-5 in Sioux City. Highlights were the worship and the raising of \$43,000 for the malaria and World Hunger eradication initiatives. There was great joy at the announcement of the offering and great joy as men, women and youth who love God and love the church, come together to lift up our voices in praise and glory. Hymns and songs are sung with enthusiasm and the preaching is meaningful and the sacraments are shared. Your only voting members were Pastor Rod and Renae Hopp and Travis Beck. Next year I hope we can do better.

The theme of the assembly was "God's work. Our hands." We focused on the mission of the church. Reports were heard from Bishop Last as he spoke about the uplifting work we are doing in Tanzania with our companion Synod, the Southern Diocese Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania (ELCT). Sadly mission support from congregations is nearly 30% less than in 2008 and this has meant significant trauma in staffing reductions, reduced capacity for ministry, reduced Churchwide support and loss of wages for Synod staff. Reductions in mission support "impact the capacity of this great church to support its social service agencies, missionaries, seminaries, hunger, malaria, and disaster relief efforts, new church starts, its international relationship through LWR, LWF, chaplaincies, colleges and ecumenical relationships...." Bishop Last said. We heard from Bishop Mark Hanson (via video) and from Rev. Raphael Malpica Padilla, the Executive Director for the ELCA's Division for Global Missions. Pastor Padilla led Bible Study on Micah on Saturday and challenged us as people of God to rebuild community. He

called us to "see the face of God in the other."

There were only five resolutions before the assembly this year. One: amend the Synod's constitution to be more inclusive of clergy who are on leave from call, disabled or retired, to have voice and vote at the assembly. Two: Compensation guidelines for clergy and rostered laity. Three: Adopt the revised budget for the fiscal year beginning February 1, 2011 and the proposed budget for 2012. Four: Proposal to memorialize the 2011 Churchwide Assembly to amend the Churchwide Constitution to require any social statement of the church to be ratified by a two-thirds majority vote of all the duly constituted congregations of the church before becoming a social statement of the church (this resolution failed). Five: Empower the Synod to create an advisory committee to review the work and mission of the Western Iowa Synod, and provide written report to the Synod Council for action. This resolution passed and will specifically look at conference boundaries in order to restructure conferences now that twenty or so congregations have left the ELCA.

It is time for us to be the church. It is time for us to rebuild community based on faith in God and love for God's creation. Division only corrupts and diverts our energy and attention from the work of ministry. There is no perfect church and we are called to be the church of today and to share Christ's love and to build relationships that matter. We are a church that's making a difference in the world and I pray that you come with us to be the most faithful church we can be.

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Don't Let Church Get in the Way of God's work

If you're reading this early Saturday, say a little prayer for me. I'm somewhere on a roof with a hammer and a really bad attitude. I've come by this mood honestly. I'm tired because I got out of bed at the crack of dawn. I'm nervous because oafs like me don't do well on ladders. Finally, I'm annoyed because I wish I were better at this.

This is me and some other guys from the ward helping a neighbor replace the shingles on his house. The original shingles are somewhere in Nevada, courtesy of the %&*@! wind that never stops blowing in Herriman. There are at least 40 reasons why I shouldn't be up here. Forty-one if you count my thumb, which I already know I've hit, even though I'm writing this before it actually happened. I'm doing it for just one reason: service. Being there for people who need my help is the one part of church that really makes sense to me.

I used to believe church was more than this. Church was all about propriety and numbers and form and legitimacy and status quo and whether I was wearing a necktie. Sermons, lessons, rituals, conformity, bureaucratic obedience. I really believed all this stuff was the essence of doing right. Consequently, I put a lot of effort into religious things that only made other people feel good, probably because it made them feel safe.

All of that crashed one day. Most of what I thought was important turned out to be the holler and bother that kept me from doing what really was. Since then, I've tried to make sure church didn't get in the way.

It's still important to some. Recently, a fellow Mormon wrote demanding to know if I was still a member of the church. Apparently, what he's read here makes him wonder how anyone who doesn't see it his way could be a member.

Don't Let Church Get in the Way of God's work

Ironically, his query was followed by one from a non-Mormon equally insistent that I explain how I could possibly stay a member of the LDS Church given all the evidence against its claims.

This is the part about church or religion that bothers me. A deeply personal process intended to bring human beings closer to God is actually more of a process for turning us into nitpickers and busybodies.

When we get like this, where we are and what we look like becomes more important than what we're supposed to be doing for each other. Church becomes the end rather than the means.

It's too bad, really. In many cases church has become the very thing that makes it impossible to be of service to one another. We're too busy trying to prove one another wrong to see what we could be doing to help.

Imagine for a moment that God is a car. Yes, I know, for some of you God is more like an airplane or a boat or a spaceship or even a ham sandwich. But hang with me for a minute, OK?

If we can equate God to a brand-new car, and our faith in him as a desire to go for an amazing ride, then religion seems to be the part where we squabble over the hubcaps.

Church is still important. I sit. I listen. I try not to be bored. Mostly, though, church is where I go to find out how to get on someone else's roof.

The Social Principles

Part 8

Suicide—We believe that suicide is not the way a human life should end. Often suicide is the result of untreated depression, or untreated pain and suffering. The church has an obligation to see that all persons have access to needed pastoral and medical care and therapy in those circumstances that lead to loss of self-worth, suicidal despair, and/or the desire to seek physician-assisted suicide. We encourage the church to provide education to address the biblical, theological, social, and ethical issues related to death and dying, including suicide. United Methodist theological seminary courses should also focus on issues of death and dying, including suicide.

A Christian perspective on suicide begins with an affirmation of faith that nothing, including suicide, separates us from the love of God (Romans 8:38-39). Therefore, we deplore the condemnation of people who complete suicide, and we consider unjust the stigma that so often falls on surviving family and friends.

We encourage pastors and faith communities to address this issue through preaching and teaching. We urge pastors and faith communities to provide pastoral care to those at risk, survivors, and their families, and to those families who have lost loved ones to suicide, seeking always to remove the oppressive stigma around suicide. The Church opposes assisted suicide and euthanasia.

The Social Community

The rights and privileges a society bestows upon or withholds from those who comprise Methods with it indicate the relative esteem in which that

society holds particular persons and groups of persons. We affirm all persons as equally valuable in the sight of God. We therefore work toward societies in which each person's value is recognized, maintained, strengthened. We support the basic rights of all persons to equal access to housing, education, communication, employment, medical care, legal redress for grievance, and physical protection. We deplore acts of hate or violence against groups or persons based on race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, religious affiliation, or economic status. Our respect for the inherent dignity of all persons leads us to call for the recognition, protection, and implementation of the principles of The Universal Declaration of Human Rights so that communities and individuals may claim and enjoy their universal, indivisible, inalienable rights.

Rights of Racial and Ethnic Persons— Racism is the combination of the power to dominate by one race over other races and a value system that assumes that the dominant race is innately superior to the others. Racism includes both personal and institutional racism. Personal racism is manifested through the individual expressions, attitudes, and/or behaviors that accept the assumptions of a racist value system and that maintain the benefits of this system. Institutional racism is the established social pattern that supports implicitly or explicitly the racist value system. Racism plagues and cripples our growth in Christ, inasmuch as it is antithetical to the gospel itself. White people are unfairly granted privileges and benefits that are

TEMPERING OUR TEMPER

Do you ever wish you could take back something you said? Or did? If you've ever been TOO angry, this may be for you.

A young girl came into the house with a tear in her pants. Her mother was exasperated, as this had happened too many times before. At her wits end, she said to her daughter, "Now you go into your room, take off those pants, and sew up that tear!" The poor child had never held needle and thread in her life.

So understandably, a little while later her mother saw the pants crumpled on the floor of her daughter's bedroom—still torn. She looked around for her daughter. Spying the basement light on, she called down the stairs, "Are you down there running around with your pants off?"

A big voice boomed up, "No ma'am. I'm reading the gas meter."

Of course, what parent can't relate to her exasperation?

On the other hand, I DO have trouble understanding the guy in Los Angeles who was arrested for negligent discharge of a weapon after shooting his toilet bowl five times with a handgun (and yes, this is true). Why did he assault the commode? He apparently exploded when he couldn't extract a hair brush his daughter flushed down.

He might benefit from the advice of one of America's great presidents, Thomas Jefferson, who cautioned, "When angry, count to ten before you speak; if very angry, count to 100." I think it applies to discharging weapons, too.

Maybe another technique works better for you. One husband asked his wife, "When I get mad at you, you never fight back. How do you control your anger?"

She smiled at him. "I clean the toilet bowl." (Uh-oh, toilets again.)

"How does that help?"

"I use your toothbrush," she said sweetly.

It's not that anger is a bad thing in itself. A good bit of fire in the belly may be needed to right the world's wrongs. But this isn't about righteous indignation. It's about tempering our temper.

I've seen marriages destroyed, careers derailed and relationships of all kinds decimated by uncontrolled rage. It's no wonder all of the world's great religions have something to say about it. To name a few, the Buddha said, "You will not be punished for your anger, you will be punished by your anger." In the Koran we find, "He is not strong and powerful who throws people down, but he is strong who withholds himself from anger." And in Christian scripture Jesus instructs, "If someone strikes you on the right cheek, turn to him the other also." You get the idea.

I like the motto Mahatma Gandhi hung on his wall at Sevagram: "When you are in the right, You can afford to keep your temper; When you are in the wrong, You can't afford to lose it."

I'm sure I could never say it better.


denied to persons of color. Racism breeds racial discrimination. We define racial discrimination as the disparate treatment and lack of full access to resources and opportunities in the church and in society based on race or ethnicity. Therefore, we recognize racism as sin and affirm the ultimate and temporal worth of all persons. We rejoice in the gifts that particular ethnic histories and cultures bring to our total life. We commend and encourage the self-awareness of all racial and ethnic groups and oppressed people that leads them to demand their just and equal rights as members of society. We assert the obligation of society and groups within the society to implement compensatory programs that redress long-standing, systemic social deprivation of racial and ethnic people. We further assert the right of members of racial and ethnic groups to equal opportunities in employment and promotion; to education and training of the highest quality; to nondiscrimination in voting, in access to public accommodations, and in housing purchase or rental; to credit, financial loans, venture capital, and insurance policies; and to positions of leadership and power in all elements of our life together. We support affirmative action as one method of addressing the inequalities and discriminatory practices within our Church and society.



All these things and many more are nice but are they effective in bringing a person into relationship with Christ? The short answer to this question is YES and NO!

Yes they are effective in HELPING to bring a person into relationship with Christ because they break the ice and offer opportunity for you to build a relationship with the person.

Are YOU a Squanderer?

However if your efforts stop at just inviting them to church (or an event) then you are squandering the opportunity and you may as well just save your breath if you have no intention of going further in a relationship with them.

YOU must be this and...

This relationship can be described in one word DISCIPLESHIP. We are called to BE disciples and to MAKE disciples. In fact in Matthew 28:19, Jesus says we are to "GO & MAKE Disciples".

How LONG will it take?

This does not mean a 12 month program then you go onto your next 'target for Christ' but it is a lifetime commitment to that person. Initially it may mean you are investing a lot of time into them, but over time their need for you will become less and less, but you will still be their spiritual parent.

Sorry, but that excuse doesn't cut it.

You may think that you do not have enough experience or knowledge about the things of God, but that is not the point, nor is it an excuse that is valid. As you grow, you help your friend grow, and they help their friend grow. Think of it in terms of the pyramid of Champagne glasses, that the waiter pours liquid only into the top most glass, but all eventually become full. It is imperative to our Christian growth that we plug into each other. So, Let us GO and MAKE disciples.


Be genuinely interested in the them.

Ten years ago, people sat in disbelief in their offices in down-town Roanoke and watched or listened as reports from the attacks of 9-11 were broadcast over radio, television, and the Internet. Soon, the phone lines at Greene Memorial began to ring as lawyers, engineers, and office workers called to see if our sanctuary was open for prayer. The doors of the sanctuary were opened and streams of people, looking for a place of comfort and hope, began pouring through the doors.

Mike Lyle, the pastor at that time, asked Bonnie, our church secretary, to print up verses from Psalm 27 to give those streaming into the sanctuary. She printed and reprinted and reprinted again those verses as people came through our doors looking for solace.

In a time of tragedy, people who lived and worked downtown turned to Greene Memorial to provide sanctuary for them in the midst of their shock and disbelief.

This Sunday, September 11, we will again open our doors to provide hope and comfort on the 10th Anniversary of 9-11. We have made provision to close off the street in front of the church from 9:00 to 10:00 as people gather for the combined worship service. At 10:00 a bagpiper will lead the honor guard during the opening processional. We will light candles and remember—remember those who lost their lives and remember the courage and self-sacrifice of the first-responders. Mayor Bowers will be here to thank our local police and fire and rescue departments for their ongoing service to the community and we will close the service with the ringing of a bell of hope.

I hope that you can join us for the informal gathering at 9:00 and the special 9-11 observance at 10:00 as we once again open our doors to support one another as we pause and remember.

Hunger and Thirst

"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled."

Grace's Lenten Journey begins on Ash Wednesday, March 9th as we start our 40 day journey to the cross of Good Friday and the empty tomb of Easter.

We are hungry and thirsty people. We hunger and thirst for God. We seek and yearn for his love and forgiving ways in our world. We seek to be fed by a deep abiding sense of his presence, as we thirst for the refreshing Spirit to flow forth from our hearts into the lives around us.

Yet, as we begin on Ash Wednesday, March 9, we start with repentance, admitting that we often hunger and thirst after the wrong things. Ashes are marked on our foreheads and words are spoken: "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return." It is the time we seek God's righteousness, forgiveness, and love.

Lent is a long journey. It is a 40 day period of spiritual investment. During this journey we set aside time for deeper moments of prayer, worship, fasting, acts of charity, scriptural meditation and Bible reading...all meant to help us step away from those things that hinder us in our spiritual journeys, as well as prepare us for the celebration of our Lord's Resurrection on Easter.

In order for us to reflect upon our "thirst" and "hunger", our weekend worship services will focus upon some of the early incidents of Jesus' ministry: his temptation in the wilderness, his encounter with various hungry and thirsty people - a religious leader, as well as a notorious Samaritan woman; a blind man, and a man so sick he had died. All of these stories are meant to help us look inwardly, to help us realize that our hunger and thirst in life can only be filled and quenched as we change and deepen the ways we follow Jesus.

In addition to weekend worship, a 7:00 p.m. Wednesday Evening Lenten Service will be offered. Using the Holden Village Vespers in our worship we will watch the powerful Nooma teaching videos that lead us to reflect how

I give up!
(It's not what you think...)

I give up...12 things actually. Well, it's technically 12 *categories* of things. My wife Cathy and I are doing a shopping

fast during Lent for a bunch of reasons: <u>spiritual</u>-we always need to grow & combat our materialistic tendencies; <u>practical</u>-we have way too much stuff; and <u>financial</u>-we want to cut back and trim our spending. We got the idea from my friend <u>Julie Bullock</u>, who did a much more restricted six-month shopping fast a couple years ago and had this to say:

"Why do a shopping fast? I came to appreciate three reasons: Discipline; Resourcefulness; and Opportunities for Generosity." (for more on this, go to: http://www.generouschurch.com/481)

Back to the fast Cathy and I are doing. Here's what we "negotiated' together as the ONLY items we can buy: 1)fruits; 2)vegetables; 3)bread/bagels/pasta/rice; 4) meat/cheese/eggs; 5)mustard/ketchup/salsa; 6) breakfast bars; 7)basic cleaning supplies; 8)basic toiletries; 9)cat food/litter; 10)milk & half ½ 11) coffee; 12)gas & oil for cars. (okay, so we lumped some things together – hey, it's our fast!)

So that means no clothing; no buying coffee out; no beer or wine (can I say that in a church newsletter?); no new furniture; no movies out; no eating out; the list goes on. Sorry Sam's Club and Target and Kohl's and Caribou...we won't be frequenting you much in March and April.

But why do a fast? In addition to, or combined with what Julie had to say above? Probably the biggest reason is because it's a primary spiritual discipline and a great catalyst for intentional spiritual growth. Stuck in your faith walk? Fast. Confused about things? Fast. Can't sleep because you're worried about money? Fast. As Richard Foster says:

"Superficiality is the curse of our age. The doctrine of instant gratification is a primary spiritual problem. The desperate need today is not for a greater number of intelligent people, or gifted people, but for deep people." - from Celebration of Discipline: The Path to Spiritual Growth

And when the disciples had difficulty casting out a spirit, Jesus said:

'So He said to them, "This kind can come out by nothing but prayer and fasting." (Mark 9:29)

And there are countless other references to fasting in the Bible. It's a good thing to do and one that will help you in your spiritual growth.

But there are other things you could do during Lent, as it's a great time to reflect; pause; dig deeper; and connect with the spirit of the Lenten season as you seek to draw closer to God. Here are a few: 1)Use the "Generosity" devotional by Gordon McDonald; 2)Read "Making Room For Life" by Randy Frazee and seek to slow down the pace of your life; 3)do your own shopping fast; 4) fast from something else that, for you, tends to get in the way of following God.

Most of all, be intentional, and take advantage of Lent – and our focus on hunger and thirst - for restoration and renewal. God wants us to spend more time with him and listen for his voice. He loves us beyond anything we can imagine. *I give up*. And so can you!

Where Have All the Students Gone?

Over the past few months of working in youth ministry at Grace, I have noticed some things. As I sit in front of the congregation Sunday after Sunday and look out on all the faces, I've noticed that there are not a huge amount of high school students in worship. I am pleased and encouraged by the students I do see, but I have to wonder where the others have gone.

The second thing I notice is that there is a huge fallout of students between the Confirmation event and involvement in youth group in 10th grade. Our students attend catechism faithfully for three years during middle school, they work with a mentor during the Own Your Faith year, get Confirmed, and then... they disappear.

I don't think Grace is unique in this phenomenon. Across the country young people are increasingly disengaging with the institutional church. As the Pastor of Youth Ministries I have to ask myself, "Why?"

Why do students not feel a strong desire to attend regular worship and/or youth group meetings? Is it because they are just too busy? Do they not care? Is it not modeled at home? Or, does the church just not meet the real needs of the student?

If we are all honest, the answer is all of the above. Between excessive homework, two or three extracurricular activities, a job, and friends from school, students barely have time to breath. Church becomes one more menu item on an already crowded schedule. Let's face it. If the church doesn't meet a felt need, then what's the motivation to come?

I recently read a blog post titled "Why Millennials Are Leaving the Church...You won't believe this!" The article states:

"Millennials are in a different social situation. They don't need physical locations for social affiliation. They can make dinner plans via text, cell phone call or Facebook. In short, the thing that kept young people going to church, despite their irritations, has been effectively replaced. You don't need to go to church to stay connected or in touch. You have an iPhone."

I would love to have some honest dialogue around this topic with both students and parents. In 2010, Grace Lutheran church continued a monthly ministry that has been going on for over 15 years. As a congregation, we serve a hot meal to Our Savior's Homeless Shelter on the first Monday of every month. The team wants to extend a big THANK YOU to all of the volunteers that have helped make this such an ongoing commitment to the homeless. This past year, at least 25 people helped with the ministry for the first time. This willingness to participate allows Grace Lutheran to be a caring congregation as far away as downtown Minneapolis. For those of you who are not familiar with this ministry, Our Savior's Housing is "a community of hope for those who need a home. Our mission is eliminating homelessness by providing shelter, support and a chance to start over." The first is, of course, to pray. Mark your calendars for the first Monday of every month. There will be members of our congregation preparing a

meal, gathering in a serving team, travelling to Minneapolis and serving a meal to people who are in need of shelter.

- Third, volunteer to be on a serving team, and go to the shelter on the 1st Monday of the month.
- Fourth, you may want to contribute money to the fund at church that is set aside to help with the cost of the meals.
- Finally, if you have a passion for serving the homeless, we could use a few more team leaders, someone willing to take the volunteers down to Minneapolis and coordinate the meal a couple of times per year.

In this service, as in so many opportunities here at Grace church, we are truly blessed to be a blessing. When the teams return after doing the work of the body of Christ, there is often a sense of being the recipient of the mercy of God, rather than the givers. Why and how do we use ashes on Ash Wednesday?

Ash Wednesday is the Wednesday of the seventh week before Easter and the first day of Lent. The day is named for the practice of imposing ashes, a practice which many Lutheran congregations have found to be a very meaningful part of the Ash Wednesday liturgy.

Using ashes as a sign of repentance is an ancient practice, often mentioned in the Bible (e.g., Jonah 3:5-9; Job 42:6; Jeremiah 6:26; Matthew 11:21). The early Christians adopted the use of ashes from Jewish practice as an external mark of penitence.

Ashes symbolize several aspects of our human existence:

• Ashes remind us of God's condemnation of sin, as God said to Adam, "Dust you are and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19).

- Ashes suggest cleansing and renewal. They were used anciently in the absence of soap. On Ash Wednesday
 ashes are a penitential substitute for water as a reminder of our baptism.
- Ashes remind us of the shortness of human life, for it is said as we are buried: "earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust."
- Ashes are a symbol of our need to repent, confess our sins, and return to God






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Fact: Every day nearly 8,000 children under the age of 5 die of hunger-related causes.

It would be nice if we could include some or all of this information in this weekend's *E*-pistle.

- o Monday evening, September 12, will be the first rehearsal (at I-T) of the combined Cathedral and Immanuel-Trinity Hand Bell Choir and Vocal Choirs. At 6:00pm there will be an Introduction to Hand Bells for all who need a refresher or have not played before. Vocal choir will rehearse at 7:15pm. All are welcome to join one or both groups.
- o Our Combined Choirs will sing next Sunday, September 18 at the 10:00 Eucharist at the Cathedral. They will sing "The Lord is My Shepherd" by Howard Goodall. This setting is used as the theme music for the British comedy show "The Vicar of Dibley."

- 4. The following came as an announcement from the Bishop's Office this week:
- "The Rev. Karl Schaffenburg has accepted the call to serve as the next Rector of Grace, Sheboygan. He

will begin duties the 1st Sunday of Advent."

Many of you know Karl; some don't. Karl and his wife, Elizabeth, were members at the Cathedral during his years of study for the priesthood at Nashota House. Since ordination in 2006, he has been Rector of The Church of the Incarnation in West Point, MS. Congratulations, Karl and Elizabeth!

- **5.** In last weekend's Gospel (Matthew 18:15-17), Jesus taught us what I call "*The Rule of Gospel Conduct*." Referring to the inevitability of conflict in our church life, Jesus teaches:
 - o Step One is to go to the person: "Go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone."
 - O Step Two is to seek out a truly impartial mediator: "If you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you."
 - O Step Three is to reflect the issue against our Christian values and traditions for insight: "If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church;"
 - O Step Four is to give the person a "time out" to cool down and reflect: "And if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector."

Among my observations in my Sermon:

- o It sometimes seems as though we tend to ignore Steps One and Two don't go to the person, and don't involve a mediator but we tell others instead, make the issue public, and feed a lot of gossip. Quite honestly, I have so much confidence in Step One that I truly think most conflicts could be addressed and resolved were we all to simply take the Step One first.
- O With respect to Step Four, while we as a congregation would never cast anyone aside, folks these days sometimes cast the congregation aside without ever attempting to resolve their issues by taking Steps One, Two, and Three.

Jesus is our Master Teacher. "The Rule of Gospel Conduct" works, and our bonds of affection and God's grace are deep and powerful! When we try Jesus' ways, miracles seem to happen!

6. And someone shared an article titled: "Controversy with Compassion: A Guide to Church Conflict" by Charles Dickson. I quote:

There's a story about a farmer who offered to sell a million frogs to the owner of a local restaurant. Since frog legs were part of the menu, the owner placed an initial order for 100 frogs.

The farmer and owner agreed on a price and the farmer proceeded to the pond near his home, where it seemed a million frogs croaked each night, disturbing his sleep. Now was the opportunity to get rid of an aggravation and make some money in the process!

A week later, the farmer returned to the restaurant with a sheepish grin on his face and two scrawny frogs in his hand. "I was wrong," the farmer confessed. "These two little guys were making all that noise! I never realized two little frogs could sound like a million.

Sometimes conflicts in congregations take on the appearance of a pond of croaking frogs. The number of

those causing the conflict can be vastly overestimated, and we can lose perspective on the real intensity of the disturbance.

Still, we want our churches to be centered on the gospel of Christ and to be safe places to discuss issues. But too many congregations haven't learned ways in which this can be achieved. Handled in a compassionate and caring manner, controversy need not be a divisive factor in our congregations.

Guidelines for Constructive Conflict

Some issues certainly are worth arguing about, and we can learn to do so in the spirit of being sisters and brothers in Christ. The following are some guidelines for having constructive conversations about controversial issues:

<u>Recognize the complexity of the issue – charitably</u>. Episcopa-lians typically consider three sources of authority when making decisions affecting their church or personal lives: Scripture, Tradition, and Reason. Each of these helps, but imperfectly:

- O Scripture is often employed on both sides of a debate, and must be approached in a charitable manner.
- o Tradition is diverse, and examples can be cited for many sides of an issue, depending on what saints, historical figures, or eras we wish to employ to buttress our opinions.
- We Reason differently as well, and our reasoning is often dependent upon our value systems and biases.

<u>Respect those who differ with you</u>. Denying the sincerity of those with opposite opinions does irreparable damage to individuals and their relationships. Faithful Christians can and do disagree about what it means to be followers of Christ.

<u>Value other people's opinions</u>. While one person's viewpoint on a topic is valuable and ought to be heard, no one's ideas are absolute. The only absolute is God. Until we arrive at God's perfect understanding, we depend on our contrasting viewpoints to correct and enhance one another.

<u>Present viewpoints with love</u>. The truth as each person sees it can be spoken with humility and without "putting another person down." Beginning with the words "I think" leaves room for others to express their opinions. St. Paul reminds us that it is more important to be loving than it is to be right!

<u>Represent conflicting viewpoints fairly</u>. While stereotyping opponents and exaggerating their positions may be successful strategies in partisan politics, they should not be part of communication among those in the community of faith.

<u>It's okay to disagree</u>. Threatening to leave the congregation or church body is the most disruptive of all tactics. The body of Christ is called to live together in harmony, even when there are tensions around divisive issues. There is real value in taking time to listen to others and to honor their viewpoints. All parties in an honest conversation learn by examining one another's beliefs.

Strive to be loyal dissenters. When members of a congregation or church body move in a direction that

some members find objectionable, employ the art of loyal dissent. We don't win every argument. People learn this from every social group of which they are part. An individual's particular viewpoint isn't necessarily the one that will be accepted by the group. So a loyal dissenter does not pull out of the congregation or leave the church, but remains committed to its overall mission while maintaining her or his personal opposition to certain issues. And this can be done with a spirit of integrity, as well as respect for the majority's decision.

The witness of Christ's church is needed to help heal the gaping wounds that afflict our society. But our witness is contradicted when our conversations with one another exude hatred rather than compassion. One of the most important lessons the church might teach the world is how to continue to live and love together during times of disagreement. We will always have controversy. The question is – will we engage it with compassion?

7. And someone shared the following from a newsletter article. This too touches on the inevitability of conflict and importance of checking our biases:

A young couple moves into a new neighborhood.

The next morning while they are eating breakfast, the young woman sees her neighbor hanging the wash outside. "That laundry is not very clean," she said. "She doesn't know how to wash correctly.

Perhaps she needs some better laundry soap." Her husband looked on, but remained silent.

Every time her neighbor would hang her wash to dry, the young woman would make the same comments.

A month later,

the woman was surprised to see a nice clean wash on the line! She said to her husband:

"Look she learned how to wash correctly!

"Look, she learned how to wash correctly!

I wonder who taught her this?"

Her husband said,

"I got up early this morning and cleaned our windows."

And so it is with life.
What we see when watching others

depends on the purity of the window through which we look.

8. If you are a "team player" and have the best interest of the Cathedral at heart: We need you to consider membership on the Cathedral Chapter – our leadership team. Every year, right after Labor Day, we put nomination forms on the table in the back of the Cathedral. They will be there until just before Thanksgiving. There is an *Orientation Meeting* for all the *nominees* during December. At that meeting, nominees <u>discern</u> whether they feel <u>called</u> to Chapter membership, at which time they become <u>candidates</u>. The congregation then <u>elects</u> its representatives from among the candidates at the <u>Annual Meeting</u> on the last Sunday of January. Terms are for three years. Please consider. Is the Lord calling you? (Those who have served in past years: Is the Lord calling you...again?)

May all who died on 9-11 rest in God's peace!

From the editor

Many shoppers don't realize the number of hours Thrift Shop coordinator Jan Degner and Furniture Annex coordinator Gene Degner donate to keep our shops well-stocked and efficiently organized. Recently they told stories at a church discussion forum. Below are a few of their stories. Our readers may be surprised at the things that go on at the two shops.

There's something magic about this place! (Jan Degner, Thrift Shop)

- As one of our volunteers set about preparing for the May wedding display in the entrance to the shop, she discovered that there were not enough wedding items for the display. Suddenly, within moments, an enormous bag of wedding clothes and items appeared at the drop-off in back of the shop. In Jan's words: "We turn around and there it is!".
- We recently spent a sunny weekend afternoon looking for pussy willows, found lots of them, tied them in bunches, and sold them at the shop for \$4.00 a bunch.
- A group of high school boys came in one day during lunch and asked for cowboy boots. These boys now talk about the shop as "their store" and are regular shoppers. Their initiation to the thrift shop started with their discovery of tuxedos, all of which they

purchased at the shop.

• The word about bargains has spread through the Lakeland high school population, For example, the high school hockey team arrived one day and bought sport coats. Size wasn't an issue; they just wanted them "big!" Also, a group of high school students who took responsibility for producing, directing, staffing, and publicizing a play at the Campanile purchased their outfits at the thrift shop. We now put aside specially-marked boxes for theater "productions."

St Matthias

- A while back we were invited to the old Catholic Church to select what we wanted from items the church left behind after its move from temporary quarters to their new facility. We got an incredible number of drink glasses, two elaborate seven foot candelabras, and a kneeler and three wrought iron chairs that have been refurbished for use in our church.
- The Saturday before our seasonal turnover of merchandise (occurs in the fall and spring of the year), everything left in the shop after a week of sales is free. This spring Boxes of Love took almost everything, and the shop was practically free of merchandise by closing time.
- Every week we haul an average of 140 bins of clothing and shoes to the Senior Center, where they are sorted for GoodWill. Seniors at the Center raise over \$10,000 yearly for their Center through this recycling initiative.



Back to Church

As the summer season ends and the Fall season begins, everyone is aware that it is time to get back to the normal routine. Indeed, as I write this, teachers and students are already back to school. For

many churches, it also means going back to regular programming and activity. For us at St. Peter's, our plan is to not only go back to regular programming and activity, but to church as it should be. Our hope is that we will recommit ourselves to the ordinary things such as worship and fellowship, as well as seriously consider such things as Christian Education that are very crucial to our Christian faith but have had little opportunity to engage in before.

What Kind of Church?

As I think about the "Back to Church" idea, I am reminded that church means different things to different people. For some, Church is the old building with beautiful windows where people go to fulfill their Christian duty when nothing else is going on in their lives. For others, church is the place where we are supposed to go if we need something from God or the people who claim to represent him. If we don't need anything, or are not sure if we could indeed get what we want, then there is no reason to go. For others still, church is the place where those who have it together go to show off their good clothes or good cars and brag about how good

God has been to them. For others, church is the place where all the hypocrites go. For others, who I wish were more than they really are, church is more than a place, more than an institution, but a calling, an invitation to love and be loved. You probably know many other ways people perceive church and the basis on which they determine their level of participation or lack of.

Church as a Community of Love

My personal perception of church is what I refer to as a community of love. It is a gathering, a coming together of individuals and families who feel, in one way or the other, a calling to follow Jesus and have decided to come and find out what that calling is all about. Once gathered, these people somehow discover that church is all about the God who loves us and has commanded us to love one another just as he has loved us (John 13:34). As they love each other, they begin to realize that God calls them to extend that love to their neighbors (Romans 13:9); and even their enemies (Matthew 5:44). Church as I understand it is a group of people who know they are loved by God and are committed to loving God and all that he has made. Whatever they do together or separately is centered around that core belief. Their worship, their fellowship, their education/discipleship, their service, their outreach and whatever else they do are ways of expressing the love of God among them.

Such is the kind of church I pray we will experience and invite others to come to at St. Peter's.

It is important to remember that church as a community of love is not necessarily a perfect community because it is made of imperfect people. That's why Jesus advised his disciples on what to if a member of the community hurt another member (Matthew 18:15-17). St. Paul in his letter to the Colossians urged them to bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances they may have against one another. He commanded them to forgive as the Lord has forgiven them (Colossians 3:13-14). The church as a community of love is a place where people are aware of their own not just others' short comings; and are intentionally and prayerfully practicing the golden rule (Matthew 7:12).

May this Fall season be for us a time to come back to church as it should be; a community grateful for God's love, and committed to continued learning and practicing their love for God and his creation.




Fun in the Sun Day!



A message from Fr. McQueen, Priest-in-charge: TRANSITION

September is always a month of transition in the life of Grace Church, but this will be especially true in 2011. As always, we will be welcoming back those who have been worshipping at All Saints' Chapel, where the season concludes Labor Day weekend. Also, after a summer blessed with Sunday morning formation provided by Mr. Charleston Wilson, we will begin our regularly-scheduled Christian formation and education the following week, with students meeting Sunday School teachers downstairs and an introduction to fall programming happening upstairs in St Nicholas Hall. Yes, these are the usual things, nothing new here.

However, there are also several important changes in the life of the parish. The first is that we will begin preparation for our second Annual Meeting of 2011. You'll recall that at our first such gathering in January, the decision was made to move the date of our Annual Meeting to the fall, an idea that had been floating around for quite some time. There are several reasons that this makes more sense for Grace Church. One is that the life of the parish much more closely resembles the school year rather than the calendar year. This change allows us to use the summer, when things are slower, to do most of the planning and preparation for the church year, rather than the Advent/Christmas season. Another reason is that it allows us the opportunity to proactively lay out possible goals and strategies and how they need to be supported before the Fall Stewardship Campaign, rather than to reactively present a deficit budget after the fact. Spiritually we all have a responsibility to give as much as we're able, but from a practical standpoint, it's my hope that seeing the picture beforehand will help the Stewardship Campaign begin with some momentum.

Another reason, which is related to the last, is that it will allow us to continue to have a meeting in January that will focus entirely on the Grace Church financial picture. At Annual Meetings past, the agenda has been too large to be able to go into as much detail about the budget as it deserves. Many have expressed interest in learning more and it is the hope of the Vestry and Finance Committee that by devoting an entire parish meeting to the task, we'll be able to raise the level of understanding and awareness regarding this vital part of parish life.

From a practical standpoint, moving the Annual Meeting to the fall allows for better attendance. There are several parishioners who head south in the winter or are still traveling at the tail end of the holiday season. While that does represent a small percentage of the congregation, with the vast majority of the parish remaining here, those that remain are faced with a much more unpredictable forecast in January than in September or October. Weather conditions have been a concern every year that I've been here and that is now mostly removed, hopefully allowing for 100% parish attendance at one of the most important gatherings in the life of the parish.

The second change this September comes as a direct result of the moving of the Annual Meeting. New Vestry members will be elected at the meeting October 2, rather than in January. While they won't actually rotate on until January, we're excited to be able to bring new members on earlier so that when their terms actually begin, they can hit the ground

running. Please consider whether you may be called to serve on the Vestry and, if so, please call the church office or email Fr. McQueen. It is an excellent opportunity to invest in the parish in a particular way and to grow in your own spirituality through your service.

The final big change is, of course, the calling of the new rector. As you may know already, Fr. From the Junior Warden

I am hoping that we are getting to the end of those projects that have been on our wish list for some time. Here are several vestry approved projects:

1. We've had an ongoing (for years) WATER PROBLEM in the basement by the Seventh Street entrance when it rains heavily. Bill, our sexton, has done some things to try fixing the problem but now we have to go further, trying things that cost money. The gutters seem to not be catching heavy runoff from the roof, thus water stays close to the building and possibly ends up in the basement. The gutters may have been pushed under the roof by ladders when roof repairs were made. We will repair those gutters as well as another gutter that rusted through some time ago near the original SW entrance. We also have to re-pitch gutters on the rectory which has allowed water to spill over in the wrong places. Cost: \$500.



loosening up above the basement windows, etc. Cost: \$1,725.



- 3. Aluminum windows: Three basement windows on the NW side of the building have been without storm windows. Not good for keeping cold out of the basement! They need to be installed. Also needed is a window in the rector's office that is falling into ruin and can't open, and repair to a window near the alley door. Cost: \$325
- 4. Painting: Soffits on the west side of church, rails on the steps leading into church, three sets of double doors, a downspout and window. Just by looking at these you can tell this project is overdue. Cost: \$1,750.

These costs are in our budget's contingency fund but won't leave a lot available for the rest of the year.

Longer range: The bell tower baffles continue to deteriorate and can be either stained or covered with metal. Staining could cost \$500 plus rental of a lift for maybe \$1,000 depending on the length of time it is needed. Covering with metal is more expensive but also a permanent fix. A bid was done on this several years ago but intended funds went elsewhere. If work was needed several years ago it shouldn't baffle us to realize fixing is needed soon.

To be thinking about: The roof! No use getting a bid yet but shingles blew off four different times during the last year! The "new roof" is already over 15 years old. The garage will need reroofing too; it is over 30 years old! If anybody wants to consider a donation towards keeping the rain off our head, please think about it and let us know your good intentions. Hopefully these will be the last big projects needed in the next few years.

VOLUNTARY FIX UP PROJECTS: In June we had a dozen volunteers wash windows, paint and clean up things on our campus. We didn't finish everything. We are still looking to get a few more things finished before our new rector arrives. Please let me know that you want to help!

On another note, the vestry voted unanimously to ban concealed carry weapons on our church property.

Pastor Mark's Remarks

Are You Ready to Re-Invest?

There's the story of a ten-year-old boy who was failing math. His parents tried everything, but to no avail. Finally, at the insistence of a family friend, they decided to enroll him in a private Catholic school.

After the first day, the boy's parents were surprised when he walked in after school with a stern, focused and very determined expression on his face, and went right past them straight to his room, where he quietly closed the door.

For nearly two hours he toiled away in his room - with math books strewn about his desk and the surrounding floor. He emerged long enough to eat, and after quickly cleaning his plate, went straight back to his room, closed the door, and worked feverishly at his studies until bedtime.

This pattern continued ceaselessly until it was time for the first quarter report card.

The boy walked in with his report card, unopened, laid it on the dinner table and went straight to his room. Cautiously, his mother opened it, and to her amazement, she saw a bright red 'A"" under the subject of MATH. Overjoyed, she and her husband rushed into their son's room, thrilled at his remarkable progress.

'Was it the nuns that did it?' the father asked. The boy only shook his head and said, 'No.'

'Was it the one-on-one tutoring? The peer-mentoring?' 'No."

"The textbooks? The teachers? The curriculum?"

"'Nope,"" said the son. 'On that first day, when I walked in the front door and saw that guy they nailed to the 'plus sign,' I just knew they meant business!' (from: *America Online: McKinley IB, Nov. 6, 1997*)

Although there is some humor in the story, there's also a kernel of truth, as we return from our summer activities to get back into school and fall schedules. Certainly this is true as we re-connect and re-invest in our spiritual growth in Grace's fall activities! There needs to be a strong motivation to help us follow through and reinvest in a deep enough way to experience significance growth. And the question is, "What's our motivation?"

For me, it is a desire to go deeper in my relationship with Jesus and learn to put my faith more into action, that brings significant change in this world and the lives of others. Sometimes I am so caught up in the organizational side of the faith (something every pastor I know struggles with!) that all my time and energy is focused on "keeping everything going!" Sometimes I pray: "Lord, I don't want to play church anymore! I want to be part of a

Leftovers, do you like them?

Do you like leftovers? Sometimes I do. Things like meat loaf, pizza, tater-hot dish, and a few other dishes are pretty darn good heated up (or even cold). And then some things aren't so good the next

day or so: like salads, Chinese food, bread & rolls, but then I suppose it depends on what you like. But, let's face it, most of us would prefer, given our time availability, to have a home-cooked meal that you're eating for the FIRST time, right?

Unfortunately, many of us have the *leftover approach* when it comes to our financial giving to God, don't we? First we pay our bills, second we make sure we can afford all the essentials (food, shelter, clothing, etc), and THEN we see what's left over to give to God, right? We "eat our home-cooked meal" and then, if there's any leftover, we see if we're able to give to God's work in the world. While that would be common sense, it's not the Biblical principle regarding giving. We're called to give FIRST of what we have, i.e. giving should be a priority in handling what God has blessed us with (Exodus 23:16,19; 34:19,26; Leviticus 2:14; Numbers 28:26; Deuteronomy 26:1-2; Proverbs 3:9).

Ultimately, it's really all about our lifestyle and developing good habits in handling money and stuff. I have a financial planner friend who gives his Christian clients this piece of advice in handling money, "pay God, pay yourself, pay your bills." (Or, if you like numbers, it's the 10-10-80 rule). Oh, and by the way, the best financial management handbook around is this book called the...Bible. The challenge is that we often get hung up on the 10%. However, God has as much more to say about the other 90%. He cares about how we handle all of it and knows the details of our lives, (Matthew 12:29, Luke 12:7) including our finances.

Last month a pastor friend of mine challenged me on the number of times the Bible references money and possessions, which is over 2,300 times. So, feeling convicted I checked into it. After some searching I found a source that has all those references, divided up into 20 different categories. And guess how many categories are on giving? ONE. The other 19 deal with issues such as debt, honesty, saving, children, contentment, greed, evil uses of money, and the list goes on. When it comes to giving, most of us would like to give more, but with our lifestyle there's nothing left over.

The fact is, how we handle our money is intricately woven into our spiritual lives, though many Christians

try to separate them. Every financial decision is in fact a spiritual decision. Wouldn't you prefer financial freedom rather than continued anxiety over money? And, all of us, no matter if we have a little or a lot, could use some help managing our money and stuff. God wants us to be free from worry.

So, as we enter into another ministry year focused on our core value of weGrow, here are four challenges I want to offer as we take intentional steps in our walk of faith:

PLAN in advance how we give/save/spend money (Proverbs 27:23-27, Luke 14:28-29).

Make giving a **PRIORITY** in our **PLAN**

(1 Corinthians 16:2, 2 Corinthians 9:7, & references above).

Decide on a **PERCENTAGE** we'll give (Genesis 14:20, Malachi 3:10, 2 Corinthians 8:1-4).

Be **PROGRESSIVE** in your giving (Proverbs 11:24-25, Matthew 6:20, 2 Corinthians 8:12-15).

Lutheran Theologian Mark Allen Powell says this, "We express our love for God when we take generous portions of our money and give it away, cheerfully and sacrificially. We not only express our love; we increase it. In some mysterious way, what we do with our treasures actually affects our hearts, such that cheerful sacrifice bonds our hearts to God and helps us love God more."

So, let's forget about giving God what's leftover and give to Him first. And let's "love God more" together, as we grow to look more like Jesus.

radical and transforming faith community that doesn't talk about the faith as much as it does the faith!" And as I pray this prayer, I know the answer lies partially in the amount of spiritual investment I am willing to make.

For instance, I am praying that the Lord will use our upcoming RENEW Weekend to motivate me to covenant with others to take one spiritual habit, and use it to go far deeper than I would normally. I am praying that as I listen to some of the stories Mark Scandrette shares from his faith community's faith experiments, I will be inspired to take a deeper trust step. Finally, as many of you come to the RENEW weekend I am hoping your enthusiasm for spiritual growth will be contagious and I will get more excited about what it means to follow Jesus more intentionally!

I've shared some of my motivation and prayers about reinvesting this fall at Grace. What about you? What is going to motivate you to significant spiritual growth? Although you might not have an answer right now, I think it's important to prayerfully consider in the next couple of weeks as you seek to re-invest. Look over the various ministries and spiritual growth opportunities. Begin to consider what might build and grow your motivation to invest. And then make a goal...a decision...a step. See what God can do then!

In the meantime, I want to invite you to worship. We have a great fall planned. We start with a sermon series on building relationships entitled: "Living Together." 

GRACE 4 TANZANIA

Eleven and one half years ago, while standing in a parking lot of an unfinished ELCT church in Arusha, Tanzania, I asked the question, "What can I/we do to help finish this building?" Basically, "send stuff for a yard sale" was the answer.

For eleven years, a dedicated group from Grace has been collecting, packing, and sending the items we no longer want or use. Once the items arrived in Tanzania, the money received for selling these items has been used to finish the building with toilets, windows, etc. We have also made items, especially clothing, available at a price the people can afford.

We have sent two 20 foot and one 40 foot containers packed solid with everything from church bells to bikes. We sent two autoclaves and crutches for the clinic. We sent clothing and soft household goods. There are school supplies, nine sewing machines, eleven computers, 150 bikes and a portable potty chair on their way.

Interest in the project known as Phoebe/
Grace4Tanzania was such that in 2005, eight of us from Grace made the trip to Arusha and Kinampanda to see how things were going and to get a feel for what we could do next. We dream of another trip to see the friends we've made.

While we think and pray about our next move, we'd like to hear from you. Do you have a heart for this mission, the stuff and the extra cash needed for shipping? Pray about it and call me, Carolyn Anderson, or Karl Sluis. The cost to ship is around \$8,000. It takes about 18 months to fill a 20 foot container. The joy in doing the Lord's bidding is PRICELESS.
